## East St. Louis Sets Pace For Go to Church Movement—Great Enthusiasm Shown

EAST ST. LOUIS had a banner GO TO CHURCH Sunday. Eighty-two per cent of the population went to divine service. "How did you do it?" was the question asked by hundreds of other cities throughout the country. The answer came:

ALL CITY OFFICIALS ASKED THEIR EMPLOYEES TO GO TO CHURCH. THE CHIEF OF POLICE ASSEMBLED ALL THE POLICEMEN AT ROLL CALL AND ASKED THEM TO GO TO SOME CHURCH. JUST BEFORE GOING HOME SATURDAY NIGHT HE REVISED THE PATROL SCHEDULE OF ALL THE PATROLMEN AND DETECTIVES SO THAT THEY COULD GET AWAY TO SOME CHURCH SERVICE SUNDAY. IN THE PRESENCE OF MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS HE HANDED THE SCHEDULE TO THE SERGEANT IN CHARGE.

The chief of the fire department just after returning from a fire run Saturday afternoon assembled the entire fire department and told the men the schedule would be arranged so they could GO TO CHURCH. The superintendent of public instruction assembled all the teachers and asked them to GO TO SOME CHURCH. He also instructed them to tell their pupils to GO TO CHURCH.

THE RETAIL MERCHANTS ENTERED THE SPIRIT OF THE THING. THEY INVITED THEIR PATRONS TO ATTEND SERVICES. WHEN A WOMAN WENT TO A STORE TO MAKE A PURCHASE THE GROCER WOULD ASK HER IF SHE WOULD BE IN CHURCH NEXT DAY, OR HE WOULD SAY PLEASANTLY, "WILL I SEE YOU IN CHURCH TOMORROW?" THE DELIVERY BOYS ALSO EXTENDED CHURCH INVITATIONS. "SEE YOU IN CHURCH TOMORROW!" WAS HEARD IN MORE HOMES IN EAST ST. LOUIS THAN EVER BEFORE. THE STREET CAR COMPANIES CARRIED SIGNS GRATIS ADVERTISING THE MOVEMENT.

That's how East St. Louis did it. Other cities and towns are planning the same kind of a campaign. GO TO CHURCH!

**Treating Hangnails.** When a hangnail appears do not pull it out, but use the sharp nail scissors, clipping closely, but never so as to break the skin and bring blood. This should be done before soaking.

For the purpose of softening the nails fill a small bowl with warm water, add a cake of fine, fragrant soap and a teaspoonful of pure glycerine. Stir until a good suds is formed, remove the soap and place the fingers of one hand to soak. This may be done while the other hand is receiving the filing, if one has help. If alone do the filing on both hands first. Soak the fingers of one for ten minutes, wipe and proceed to use the round pointed stick of orange wood, this wood being selected because it is hard and does not splinter readily.

## GROWING FINE WOOL.

Climatic Conditions That Tend to Produce the Best Fleeces.

The climate has an important influence upon sheep raising. There are some sections of the country where fine woolled sheep can be raised to better advantage and other sections where mutton sheep produce the greatest profits, says the Iowa Homestead.

In order to develop a good coat of wool an animal must not be limited in the quantity of food, but the food should be of a dry character. Wool of the finest staple and produced in the greatest quantity with the least amount of work is obtained when the following considerations are met:

Good, fine woolled stock must be had to begin with. In the second place, the sheep must be grown in a warm climate. In the third place, dry, nutritious herbage must be provided, and in the last place a dry soil must be had on which the sheep may run.

It is apparent, then, that an arid country is best for raising fine wool.



The Rambouillet, or French Merino, is popular in Ohio, Michigan, Wyoming, Oregon and California. It is a fine woolled sheep, producing a fleece of the first quality. It is also a fair mutton sheep, but is not so good in this respect as the English Down breeds. The Rambouillet, like all of the Merino breeds, is unsurpassed in the amount and quality of its wool. The Rambouillet ram here shown was champion at the last International Live Stock exposition.

sheep. Experiments in many parts of the world have proved that this is the case. Where there is a great deal of dampness the fine woolled sheep do not do well. They do not thrive as they should and they do not produce wool of the highest quality.

This is the big reason why Australia is so popular as a sheep breeding country. The arid climate in certain parts of Australia seems to be just exactly right for the production of fine wool. In fact, some go so far as to say that this is the best place in the world for raising fine woolled sheep.

There are several sections of the United States, however, which have climates much resembling that of Australia. In certain parts of California fine woolled sheep thrive well.

## Milady's Mirror

Exercise For the Figure.

Lying flat on your back on the floor is a most excellent thing for your figure. When you want to rest you should never curl up on a sofa with cushions, but you should always lie quite flat, if possible, with your hands above your head. This expands your chest and hollows your back and makes your figure grow into good lines.

It is a splendid thing to lie like this for a few minutes every morning and do deep breathing exercises. Begin with your arms at your sides, holding them straight; bring them up till the tips of the fingers touch. When they are extended above the head you breathe in, and then bring them down again as you breathe out. Each breath should take as much time as you spend in counting four slowly.

If you are inclined to be too stout you can reduce by the following exercise: Lie quite flat on your back with your hands on your sides. Bend your legs up slowly into what is the kneeling position when you are upright and let them slowly go down again.

Then do breathing exercises, trying while you do them to draw in the part of your figure below your waist as much as you can. Then do the leg exercise again, and so on.

These two exercises together are splendid for your digestion and general health. Besides improving your figure they will improve your complexion and make you stronger and more vigorous than you have been for a long time.
