



ways had a true friend for the cause in Mr. Hanna, both as state senator, congressman at Washington and as governor of this state, and they are not going to be fooled at this time by the remarks of the Democratic scavenger. He says that Hanna is in league with the liquor machine of Ramsey county. Who is the liquor machine of Ramsey county? Does any fair-minded citizen of this county know or believe that there is any such machine in this county? Think of it, Mr. Voter. This great moral sheet says that the law-breakers of this county are Stalwart Republicans. The records of this county according to the returns of the assessment books show that about 75 per cent of the voters of the county are Republicans, and the democratic sheet down the street openly states that they are the law breakers. How do you like to have such a sheet published in your community and allowed to go into your homes for your children to read? If the "only democratic daily" wanted to tell the truth and place the blame where it belongs it would go after Andrew Miller, who has been the attorney general of this state for the past number of years and is now seeking to break into the U. S. Senate. Miller has posed as the great reformer, and yet it is a well known fact that when he had cases to prosecute in this county, that at the last moment when the cases he had started came on for trial Miller was "unavoidably absent," and his deputy was sent here to make a farce of the whole thing. And yet the "democratic daily" is boosting Miller, and every other candidate of his ilk. Miller was charging up to Ramsey county to make a fizzle of things, and yet down at Bismarck, the capital of the state, beer was selling for \$1 per, and houses of ill fame were running rampant, but did anyone ever hear much about Miller making any stir about those things down in his home town? Hanna, while in Congress was recognized by the prohibition people as a champion of the prohibition cause and was ever found working for it, and since he has been governor of this state he has taken the same position, and the leading prohibition people of the state well know that he stands squarely on the prohibition side of every question, but the "Democratic daily" is peeved just at this time for the reason that Governor Hanna recently removed several democratic officials from office down at Hankinson for the reason that they were allowing the violation of the prohibition law. Think of this statement: "Mr. Cuthbert is the local representative of the lawless element." We rise to ask, is there a county in the state where the prohibition law is better and more rigidly enforced than Ramsey county? There is not a blind pig running in this county at the present time, and much of the credit is due Mr. Cuthbert and Sheriff McLean for the manner in which they have gotten after the piggers. The daily refers to the "liquor men of Devils Lake" and the "liquor machine." Pray tell us who the liquor men and the liquor machine of this city are. If such a machine exists, perhaps you could enlighten our city officials, as it is a well known fact that they are keeping a close watch to see that our laws are observed. To sum the whole matter up, the statements of the daily relative to Hanna and his prohibition record is just as true as many of the other lying statements it makes—and will be paid just about as much attention to by the prohibition people of Ramsey county.

In the conviction of Lieutenant Becker for the murder of Rosenthal justice has won another triumph. That Becker was guilty there can be no question, but the strong backing he has had by the leaders of the underworld in the great city of New York has made it a task to balance the scales of justice. Attorney Whitman and the moral support he has been given has finally secured a victory, which will do much to separate the police powers of that city from the great army of grafters and criminals of the underworld. One who is really an onlooker can hardly realize what this means, not only to the city of New York, but to every large city in the nation. Already four men have paid the penalty of the murder of Rosenthal by going to the electric chair, and there is a probability of Becker following them. It has been a great victory and a great cost, but it is worth the price.

R. F. Flint, who is a candidate for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor, was a visitor in this city Friday. He was making a trip over this part of the state looking after his political fences. He is a bright and active fellow and from what we are able to gather is perfectly well qualified to fill the office he seeks in good shape.

Judging from the small number of Progressive registering in the state, the "Bull Moose" party is on the wane. This word progressive sounds very nice, but when men are actually called upon leave the Republican party, they study some before doing so. The consequences are that most of the fellows who have been styling themselves "progressives" have signed up as Republicans and will stand by the good old party, that has done so much for our country in the past fifty years.

Up to this time every spreader on the market has been constructed along the same general plan. The John Deere Spreader, however, is different. It is entirely new and there is nothing like it on the market. All the working parts are mounted on the main axle. There are no strains and stresses on the sides or frame and no clutches or chains to give trouble. The John Deere Spreader is low down, easy to load, very simple and always ready for business. It cannot get out of order.

Beater on Axle
 All the working parts on the John Deere Spreader are mounted on the rear axle. There are no independent studs or shafts to give trouble, nor chains or clutches to get out of order. All strains and stresses are borne by the main axle and are not transmitted to the side of the box or the frame of the spreader.

Light Draft—Few Parts
 There are at least two reasons why the John Deere Spreader is the lightest draft spreader made. One is that it has four sets of roller bearings; two in the front, wheels and two on the main axle and beater. They reduce the draft materially.

Roller Bearing axle and beater.
 Another reason is that the John Deere Spreader has so few parts. It has about 150 less types of castings than the simplest spreader heretofore made. It is only natural that the fewer parts a machine has, the easier it will operate.

Easy to Load
 The first three feet of the spreader are lifted with an ordinary spreader are easiest of all. The real hard work is from this height to the top of the ordinary spreader. The John Deere Spreader is low down. It is only necessary to lift each forkful three feet. Thus, the hard work of loading a measure spreader is done away with. Besides, the person doing the loading can see inside the spreader at all times. Each forkful is placed exactly where it is needed.

No Adjustments
 On the John Deere Spreader no adjustments are necessary. On the simplest spreader heretofore made there are twenty adjustments before the machine would work at all. John Deere Spreading is thrown in gear by moving a heavy dog back until it engages a stop at the rear of the machine. No clutch used.

Positive Non-Rocking Action
 By the use of a very simple locking device inside the ratchet feed, the apron is positively locked against rocking when spreading up hill or over exceedingly rough ground. The result is that when spreading with the John Deere Spreader the measure is always spread evenly. This is not possible on any other ratchet feed spreader made.

Change of Feed
 Change of feed is accomplished by a double shoe which is moved from the seat. This shoe determines the number of teeth the ratchets engage at each stroke. The John Deere Spreader has a variation of from five to twenty-five loads to the acre.

Substantial Steel Frame, Like the Modern Railway Bridge
 Both the side sills of the John Deere Spreader are of high carbon channel steel with the channels turned to the inside. Into these hollows are fitted four large wooden cross sills. Being bolted, these cross sills can be kept tight, insuring rigidity and alignment of frame at all times.
