COLLECT HORSES THROUGH CANADA

Montreal, Aug. 4.—"Arrangements are being made to collect 30,000 horses in Canada should England have need of them in the war." This was the statement made by an official of the National Live Stock Exchange, Ltd., the head office of which is in Montreal. "The cavalry horses which have been produced by the National bureau of breeding during the past eight years are now in great demand," he said.

A cable from London yesterday stated that the British remount, inspectors

would leave for Montreal immediately should England mobilize. These remounts have been produced by farmers and small breeders all over Canada.
