TRUSTEES DENY THEY BROKE LAW

Bismarck, N. D., Aug. 31.—Flat denial that any action taken by the board of trustees of the North Dakota Agricultural College in connection with the merger of the North Dakota Better Farming association and the experimental station subjects them to the charge of misconduct of office, is made by members of the board.

The question has been laid before Governor L. B. Hanna, who in turn has placed it before Attorney General Miller for a ruling as to the sufficiency of the grounds alleged as a cause for removal.

C. E. Nugent of Fargo, Clark Kelley of Devils Lake, George H. Hollister of Fargo, Alex Stern of Fargo, E. Jensen, of Westhope, and William Weigel of Hebron, are the members of the board of trustees who are under fire, and who make denial of any illegal transaction.

The alleged details of the merger show that the \$40,200 in contracts made by the better farming association, and assumed by the experimental station, were covered by private subscriptions, aid from the government, and aid from the counties in which the work was being carried on.

By this showing, it is maintained that the state was in no way affected, financially, by the merger—the state being exempted from heavy financial drain, as had been alleged.

The proposition made by the board of trustees of the agricultural college to the board of directors of the better farming association, is also made public. It deals particularly with the methods of operating, and covers the government of experiment station, where, it is pointed out, the director of the experiment station shall take over full control, and members of the faculty in that department, and the extension department, and the farmers' institute department, were to be made accountable to the station director.

Sensational charges that "big business" seeks a hand in college affairs are scouted.

M'REYNOLDS TAKES OATH

Washington, Sept. 2.—James C. McReynolds will take the oath of office tomorrow as associate justice of the United States, and T. W. Gregory will assume the office of attorney general. Chief Justice White will administer the oath of office, first to Mr. Gregory and then to Mr. McReynolds. The commission of an associate justice is signed by the president and his attorney general and it is necessary that Mr. Gregory take office first.

CHIEF GAME WARDEN TALKS

E. B. McCutcheon, chief game warden, sends out the following final warning to deputies in this district, and the same might be considered good advice to those who might be inclined to be sooner.

NOTICE.

To all Deputies: The season opens Monday, Sept. 7. Be on watch the day before, Sunday, the 6th to see that no smart fellow puts it over on you. If you do your duty these two days a great deal of unlawful shooting will be avoided. There will be an average of twenty-five deputies in the field in every county in this district, in addition to several secret service men. This should put a crimp in to the violators. Examine all licenses the opening date, see that every one has a license that are required to have one. Advise all to get their licenses early. Ignore receipts. If they have no licenses, stop their hunting. Arrest or report to me. Watch the bag limit carefully. The game is so big, fat and lazy, as a result of protection, keeping them from being much molested and not constantly on the wing, that the bag limit should be easily secured, so watch that. The penalty provided by law for excess is \$10 per bird.

His father has written relatives in Utrecht, the correspondent continues, saying that his application for a commission in the French army has been granted by Minister of War Millerand.

Maj. Alfred Dreyfus is the French officer who was convicted in 1894 of having divulged state secrets to a foreign power. His case agitated France for years.

CURING MEAT ON THE FARM

The best way to eat meat is to eat it while fresh, for there is no way of preserving it that will retain all the nutrition and all the flavor. It is, nevertheless, frequently desirable to cure meat at home, and there is no reason why this cannot be done satisfactorily and economically. Salt, sugar of molasses, baking soda, and a little saltpeter are the only ingredients necessary.

Ordinarily the curing of meat should be begun from 24 to 36 hours after the animal is slaughtered. This allows sufficient time for the animal heat to leave the body entirely, but not sufficient to permit decay to set in. Once the meat is tainted, no amount of preservatives will bring back its proper flavor. On the other hand, if salt is applied too soon, obnoxious gases will be retained and the meat will possess an offensive odor. It is almost impossible to obtain good results when the meat is frozen.

Three useful recipes for popular forms are given below. The only equipment necessary for them are the ingredients already mentioned and a clean hardwood barrel, or a large stone jar or crock. In considering these recipes it is well to remember that on a whole, brine-cured meats are best for far mose. They are less trouble to prepare and the brine affords better protection against insects and vermin. A cool, moist cellar is

the best place for brine curing. The cellar should be dark enough and tight enough to prevent flies and vermin.

STEFANSSON IS AFTER NEW LAND

Nome, Sept. 1.—The gasoline schooner King and Winge, which has arrived here from Point Barrow, Alaska, brought news that Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the explorer, with two companions sent out from Martin Point, east of the mouth of the Barter river, March 22, last, with six dogs, a sled, two rifles and plenty of ammunition, heading straight north over the ice in search of new land. A supporting party of three others accompanied Stefansson sixteen days due north on the sea ice, and then returned, reaching shore April 16.

Stefansson left orders with Dr. Rudolph M. Anderson, his lieutenant in the Canadian government expedition, to establish a camp for him at Banks Land.

Stefansson may not be heard from for two years, his associates say. The three men in the Stefansson party are remarkable ice travelers, and expect to subsist on seal meat, like the dogs. Their sled is built so as to be readily convertible into a boat for crossing streams of open water in the ice.

Andrew Norman of the Stefansson expedition was lost for two days last May and was found by searching parties.

He became demented as a result of his sufferings while lost and committed suicide by shooting. This is the first fatality in the Stefansson expedition so far as known.

The King and Winge brought out the crew of four sailors from the whaler Elvira, crushed by the Arctic ice nearly a year ago.
