

LAWS ENACTED BY LEGISLATURE

grade elementary certificates.

H. B. 274—Relating to bounties for tree planting. Would change the act so that bounty paid for tree planting cannot exceed the real estate tax levied against the quarter section on which the trees are planted.

H. B. 265—Making more definite the procedure in cases of lease hold premises held under an injunction; providing a means whereby innocent owners may cancel a lease thereof.

H. B. 266—Relating to the organization of new common school districts. New district to have assessed valuation of \$120,000.

H. B. 280—Relating to partnership exemptions. Would lower the exemption of a partnership from \$1,000 to \$500.

H. B. 293—Would give electric light plants the right of eminent domain.

H. B. 300—Relating to the game and fish laws for the propagation, protection, and preservation of wild birds, wild animals and fish.

H. B. 304—Relating to the use of lignite coal in state and county institutions and schools and providing a penalty for the violation of this act.

H. B. 327—Relating to the dissolution of marriage. Grants Indians the privilege of obtaining a divorce.

H. B. 328—Relating to the payment of highway taxes. Warrants if not paid when presented because of lack of funds shall not draw any interest.

H. B. 331—Puts 2-mill tax on money and credits and provides for collection of said tax.

H. B. 335—Increases school levy from 36 to 40 mills.

H. B. 337—Making it the duty of the commissioner of university and school lands to have certified copies of patents to indemnity lands recorded in the various counties containing such land.

H. B. 344—Relating to insolvency of banks and the liquidation of the same by the state examiner. Would add the provision that banks be declared insolvent whose books are falsely or fraudulently kept.

H. B. 345—Providing for an annual school tax in special school districts. Raises the levy from 30 to 40 mills.

H. B. 355—To permit townships through their board of supervisors to build drains and to provide the manner of assessing the cost thereof and provide for its payment.

H. B. 360—Relating to qualifications of signers on petitions to county commissioners. Petitioners must be taxpayers of district affected by petition.

H. B. 363—Providing that the cost of keeping patients in the institution for the feeble minded shall be a charge against the county sending such patient; that persons liable to support such defective person shall, when able, pay the expense of treatment.

H. B. 383—Relates to the sinking fund of the wine plant.

H. B. 384—Relating to filing and numbering of vouchers and warrants.

H. B. 386—Relating to notice to debtor and time allowed for claiming exemptions in cases where personal property is levied upon.

H. B. 407—Relating to the membership of and duties of the state board of auditors.

H. B. 409—To provide for the distribution of agricultural publications.

H. B. 411—Relating to the verification of bills, claims, accounts and demands against the county.

H. B. 416—Creating a board of highway improvements within each county of this state, providing for their election, duties, meetings and compensation.

H. B. 417—Relating to high school inspectors and state aid for high schools.

H. B. 425—Relating to sheriff's certificates on execution sale, purchaser's rights and the recording of such certificate.

H. B. 475—Relating to appropriation for the glandered horse and bovine fund. Would appropriate \$10,000.

H. B. 467—Lowers the sum of the state treasurer's official bond from \$500,000 to \$100,000.

H. B. 471—Permitting a charge of tuition for attendance at any model high, graded or elementary school which is operated, maintained or in any manner connected with the state university, any normal school or any educational institution of higher learning.

H. B. 472—Relating to appropriation for contingency fund for commissioner of insurance. This would eliminate an annual appropriation of \$500.

H. B. 476—Changes personnel of state library commission and its manner of appointment.

H. B. 492—Relating to mill tax for terminal elevators. Would change levy of a mill tax to \$38,500.

H. B. 488—Relating to the wolf bounty fund. Changes levy of one-tenth of mill to a stated sum of \$50,000 for 1915, and \$20,000 for 1916.

H. B. 489—Appropriating \$32,500 for public printing not properly chargeable to any of the several departments of the state government from July 1, 1915, to July 1, 1917.

H. B. 499—Adds Sioux county to Forty-ninth legislative district, giving that district an extra representative; also creates a new district from a part of Cavalier county.

H. B. 439—Relating to expense chargeable against the estate of insane persons.

SENATE BILLS.

S. B. 9—Prescribes penalty for making false statements or entries as to

the condition of banking associations.

S. B. 11—Establishing and locating a state normal school at Dickinson.

S. B. 19—Provides asylums for the poor; allows two or more counties, jointly, to purchase and maintain such asylums.

S. B. 26—Provides that boards of education when making tax levy shall levy sufficient amount to pay accrued interest on all bonds and warrants, also to create a sinking fund for redemption of same.

S. B. 43—Authorizing the board of university and school lands to deed to the United States government one section of the state school lands in exchange for two sections of government lands.

S. B. 49—Changing the period of liens on the service of sires from one to three years.

S. B. 62—Fixing the time for answering in county courts having increased jurisdiction.

S. B. 80—Fixes compensation of attorneys appointed by the court at a sum not to exceed \$15 per day.

S. B. 82—Authorizing county courts to accept surety company bonds for executors, administrators and guardians.

S. B. 91—Relating to supervision of schools in special school districts.

S. B. 102—Relating to closing of gates on farm premises by persons other than those in lawful possession of premises.

S. B. 128—Relating to fees collected and charged by secretary of state.

S. B. 67—Restricting and prohibiting sale of certain drugs and providing a penalty for the violation thereof.

S. B. 59—To provide uniformity of text books in the common school.

S. B. 92—To provide by law for the formation of rural agricultural credit associations under the supervision of the department of state.

S. B. 14—Relating to costs in the county courts having increased jurisdiction.

S. B. 96—Providing for ports of entry, appointment of state inspectors of oils and deputies, and fixing salaries of same; and defining chemical and other tests.

S. B. 114—Changing the compensation of trustees of Soldiers' Home from \$3 to \$5 per day.

S. B. 116—Creating state board of chiropractic examiners to regulate practice of chiropractics in the state.

S. B. 117—To provide for the disposition of school and institutional lands required for educational, charitable and other purposes.

S. B. 138—Appropriating \$109,200 for maintenance, etc., of the tuberculosis sanitarium at Dunsenith.

S. B. 139—Placing telephone companies under the supervision of the board of railroad commissioners, giving same power to compel physical connections between telephone systems and to regulate rates.

S. B. 150—Appropriating \$48,000 to provide for lack of sufficient appropriation to cover necessary expenditures and emergencies of the penitentiary.

S. B. 162—To appropriate \$37,667 to the department of agricultural extension of the North Dakota Agricultural college for the years 1915 and 1916.

S. B. 171—Requiring fire drills in the public schools.

S. B. 175—Appropriating \$1,500 out of the interest and income fund of the Soldiers' Home to help maintain the Department of North Dakota of the Grand Army of the Republic.

S. B. 204—Appropriating \$1,830 to be used in enlarging and improving the facilities for handling fish at the state biological station.

S. B. 212—Relating to petition and tax levied by board of county commissioners to destroy gophers, prairie dogs, rabbits and crows.

S. B. 222—To legalize certain acts of incorporated cities, villages or school districts of this state.

S. B. 239—Relating to the manner in which claims against the state shall be filed and verified.

S. B. 244—To authorize and empower boards of trustees of county agricultural and training schools to borrow money and issue negotiable bonds.

S. B. 246—Relating to the reimbursement of owners of tubercular cattle.

S. B. 255—Relating to the equipments and sanitary conditions in hotels, restaurants and rooming houses.

S. B. 317—To define the crime of fornication and prescribing punishment therefor.

S. B. 213—Regulating maternity hospitals, boarding houses of infants and the business of placing infants, and providing for their removal.

S. B. 191—To allow school boards to levy a tax not to exceed 15 mills to pay past due warrants.

S. B. 310—Relating to the employment of inmates of the penitentiary and the sale of its products.

S. B. 124—Relating to foreclosure of land contracts.

S. B. 173—Relating to expenses, necessary fees and commissions of executors and administrators.

S. B. 178—To protect children and others from accident resulting from trespassing on the premises or right of way of railroad companies.

S. B. 282—Relating to the commitment of minors who have been convicted of felonious crimes to the reform school during good behavior.

S. B. 283—Prescribing the duties of all state officers relating to funds which may come into their possession in an official way.

S. B. 301—Relating to parole of persons confined in the penitentiary.

S. B. 305—Relating to the sale of purebred cattle for any purposes except slaughter, unless accompanied by

a certificate of health.

S. B. 280—To cancel uncollected personal property tax assessed for 1900 and prior years.

S. B. 237—Relating to the state auditing board and its duties.

S. B. 12—Providing for the establishment and location of state hospital for the insane.

S. B. 17—Providing for the levy of a tax on tillable acreage of the state to create a fund to insure owners of growing grain against losses by hail.

S. B. 48—To provide for the examination, registration and regulation of trained nurses.

S. B. 68—Relating to liens on crops on land held under a lease crop contract or a contract of sale.

S. B. 78—To establish a state bonding department in the office of the commissioner of insurance.

S. B. 98—Relating to mechanic's liens, time of commencing suits and limitations thereupon.

S. B. 103—To exempt policies of life insurance and annuities from claims of creditors in certain cases.

S. B. 109—Relating to security or bonds to be filed with the state treasurer by companies writing hail insurance in North Dakota.

S. B. 127—To provide for county aid to rural graded and consolidated schools, permits county commissioners to levy a tax for such purpose.

S. B. 129—Relating to foreign corporations.

S. B. 135—Appropriating \$80,800 for maintenance, etc., of the state reform school at Mandan.

S. B. 137—Relating to primary elections and the nomination of candidates to the office of United States senator.

S. B. 141—Appropriating \$59,900 for maintenance, etc., of the institution for the feeble minded at Gratton.

S. B. 149—Relating to dairy department in the department of agriculture and labor.

S. B. 151—Appropriating \$180,710 for the maintenance, etc., of the state penitentiary.

S. B. 152—Eliminating the board of trustees of public property and substituting the board of control.

S. B. 156—Relating to audit of state departments by public accountants.

S. B. 158—Relating to the admission of live stock into the state.

S. B. 163—To appropriate \$3,500 for purchasing supplies for use in exterminating ground squirrels, gophers and prairie dogs.

S. B. 170—Validating certain special and general elections in villages.

S. B. 174—Relating to the settlement of causes of action, or causes for damages sustained through personal injuries, and contracts of retainer made therefor.

S. B. 180—Providing for salaries of county officers, changing the basis of fixing salaries from the assessed valuation of the counties to that of the population.

S. B. 186—Appropriating \$2,000 for the years 1915 and 1916 for the North Dakota Anti-Tuberculosis association.

S. B. 187—Defining the crime of rape; changes legal age of consent from sixteen to eighteen years.

S. B. 194—Creating a board of immigration, prescribing its powers and duties and appropriating \$100,000 for the year 1915 and 1916 for the use of said board.

S. B. 196—Provides that road taxes collected by the county treasurer shall be turned over quarterly to the treasurer of cities, towns, villages and organized townships.

S. B. 201—Relating to the consolidation of schools.

S. B. 203—To prevent imposition of fraud in the sale or disposition of certain securities.

S. B. 208—To prohibit the adulteration and misbranding of foods and beverages and the selling of adulterated and unwholesome foods and beverages.

S. B. 210—Gives courts power when necessary to appoint district juvenile commissioners and to make rules and regulations prescribing their duties and fixing their compensation.

S. B. 214—Provides for the punishment of any person carrying concealed dangerous weapons or explosives.

S. B. 216—Relating to the liability of common carriers by railroad to their employees in certain cases.

S. B. 218—Provides that elections for removal of county seat shall not be held oftener than every four years.

S. B. 218—Relating to election for the removal of county seat.

S. B. 236—Authorizing the board of county commissioners to convey land which had been donated to the county for a specific purpose back to the donors, their heirs and assigns.

S. B. 238—Relating to a uniform system of accounting.

S. B. 252—Relating to causes for divorce.

S. B. 254—To provide for state insurance on public buildings.

S. B. 259—Relating to non-profit corporations.

S. B. 260—Making it a misdemeanor to show any discrimination against any person wearing the uniform of the state or nation.

S. B. 264—Relating to the cost of maintenance of patients in state tuberculosis sanitarium.

S. B. 268—Relating to declaring churches and church societies extinct, and disposing of the property of extinct churches and church societies.

S. B. 275—To provide for the construction of sidewalks in unincorporated towns and villages.

S. B. 279—Relating to board of control of state institutions and to provide for the transfer of inmates from one institution to another.

S. B. 283—Relating to public printing and the manner of distributing the Legislative Manual.

S. B. 284—Relating to the teachers' insurance and retirement fund.

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JURY FAILS TO ACCEE IN CASE OF HARRY THAW

PRISONER BACK TO TOMBS AFTER DAY'S ORDEAL—RECESS UNTIL TOMORROW.

New York, March 18.—The jury sitting in the case of Harry Thaw and four co-defendants on trial charged with conspiracy, was locked up late tonight after they had deliberated nearly five hours and failed in a verdict. Thaw was taken back to his Tombs cell. The court announced a recess until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The jurors, it was apparent by the questions asked when the foreman came in for instructions seemed to be divided upon the question as to what Thaw's legal status was at the time he escaped and what part his belief that he had a right to flee should play in the determination of a verdict.

The case went to a jury this afternoon after a day spent in completing the cross examination of Thaw.

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
