The North Dakota building at the Panama Pacific International Exposition, was the second state building to be completed on the grounds, and was the first state building on the grounds to have its exhibits in place ready for the opening day. This fact has brought a great deal of publicity to North Dakota. The further fact that North Dakota is the only corn state in the union that has a corn display in its building at the exposition is working wonders in the matter of interesting people in the state.

BILL RESTORES CONVENTIONS

DELEGATES CHOSEN AT WISCONSIN SPRING ELECTIONS WOULD MEET IN JULY.

Madison, Wis., March 25.—Senator Pray introduced a bill in the senate today providing for delegate conventions by political parties the second Tuesday of July of election years. The convention is to be based on the unit of 500 voters in an assembly district; will formulate the platform and elect by ballot the state central committee and state chairman. In presidential years it will choose the electors. Voting by proxy will be prohibited.

Delegates to be Elected. Delegates to the convention will be chosen in the spring election the first Tuesday in April. Candidates for delegates will be nominated on papers containing 3 per cent signatures of party voters at previous election and will be voted for on an official ballot to be provided at each polling place.

Candidates for delegates are limited to a disbursement of \$50 and each will be required to file a disbursement account two weeks after election. Other provisions of the corrupt practice act apply in the usual way.

WOMEN TAKE MEN'S PLACES

Rome, March 25 (via Paris)—A movement is under way in Italy to substitute women for men in work of industry and commerce, in case of complete mobilization. It is proposed the men be paid the same wages now received by men, with the provision that part of it be turned over to the families of men called to the colors.

The plan provides that women surrender the posts to soldiers when they are discharged. An office has been opened where women may register and express opinion as to what work they are best suited for.

Most of the school children were obliged to go home at noon Friday, on account of the schoolroom being too cold for them.


Miss Holicky of Lakota visited with sister, Mrs. Orvick between trains Saturday.
