PRACTICAL ADVICE ON SETTING A HEN—HOW TO DEAL WITH A BROODY BIRD—TEST FERTILITY OF EGGS.

As the time approaches for the hens to become broody or sit, if care is taken to look in the nests it will be seen that there is a few soft downy feathers being left there by the hens; also, the hens stay longer on the nests when laying at this time, and on being approached will quite likely remain on the nest, ruffling up their feathers and pecking at the intruder. When it is noted that a hen sits on the nest for two or three nights in succession, she is ready to be transferred to a nest which should be prepared for her beforehand. The nest should be in a box and composed of straw, hay, or chaff for nesting material. Pack this material down firmly and shape a circular nest out of it which should be slightly deeper in the center than at the edges, as a nest so shaped will prevent the eggs from rolling out from under the hen and becoming chilled. Dust the hen thoroughly with insect powder. In applying the powder, hold the hen by the feet head down working the powder well inside the feathers, giving special attention to regions around the vent and under the wings. The powder should also be sprinkled in the nest. The nest should be in some quiet, out-of-the-way place on the farm, where the sitting hen will not be disturbed. Move her from the regular laying nest at night. Handle her carefully in doing so. Put a China egg or two in the nest where she is to sit, and place a board over the opening so that she can not get off. Toward evening of the second day, quietly go where she is sitting, and leave some feed and water, and remove the board from the front or top of the nest, and let the hen come off when she is ready. Should she return to the nest after feeding, remove the china eggs and put under those that are to be incubated. In cool weather it is best to put not more than ten eggs under a hen, while later in the spring one can put 12 to 15, according to the size of the hen. If several hens are sitting in the same room, see that they are kept on the nests, only allowing them to come off to get feed and water, which should be once a day.

Many eggs that are laid in the late winter and early spring are not fertile. For this reason it is advisable to set several hens at the same time. After the eggs have been under the hen for seven days they should be tested to see whether they are fertile or infertile.

Infertile eggs should be removed and the fertile eggs should be put back under the hen. In this way it is often possible to put all the eggs that three hens started to sit on under two hens and reset the other hen again. For example: Thirty eggs are set under three hens at the same time, 10 under each. At the end of seven days we find on testing the eggs that 10 are infertile, which leaves us twenty eggs to reset, which we do by putting them under two hens and have the remaining one to set over again after she has set only seven days.

A good homemade egg tester or candler can be made from a large shoe box, or any box that is large enough to go over a lamp, by removing an end and cutting a hole a little larger than the size of a quarter in the bottom of the box, so that when it is set over a common kerosene lamp the hole in the bottom will be opposite the blaze. A hole the size of a silver dollar should be cut in the top of the box to allow the heat to escape. An infertile egg when held before the small hole with the lamp lighted inside the box will look perfectly clear, the same as a fresh one, while a fertile egg will show a small dark spot, known as the embryo, with a mass of little blood veins extending in all directions if the embryo is living. If dead, if the egg has been incubated for at least 36 hours, the blood settles away from the embryo toward the edges of the yolk, forming in some cases an irregular circle of blood, known as a blood ring. Eggs vary in this respect, some showing only a streak of blood. The testing should be done in a dark room.

HANSBORO MAN IS CHARGED WITH CRIME

Clarence Orton of Hansboro was recently taken in charge and is now in the Townser county jail charged with the murder of John Scott, an aged man, who suddenly disappeared nearly a year and a half ago. The remains of Scott were recently found in a manure pile on the Webster farm, which is farmed by Orton. There seems to be considerable evidence against young Orton, as when confronted by the Sheriff he tried to put the blame on another party, but his story was such that suspicion strongly points to him. He will have an examination later on.

OLE AXVIC NAMES TOWN "TIPPERARY"

D., April 15.—When representative Ole Axvic of Milton withdrew his compulsory sidetrack bill, providing for sidings near the International boundary, he received a promise from the Great Northern railway authorities that a siding will be built along the Morden branch in Fremont township, Cavalier county. This siding will be constructed at the exact point where the farmers of the community wish it, and will be located northwest of Walhalla, close to the boundary. Ole says he is going to name the new town "Tipperary." It is expected that work on the siding will begin in the early spring, so as to give ample time for the erection of grain elevator facilities at this new Cavalier county marketing point before the next crop is ready for market.


