## THE USE OF ENSILAGE

Ensilage is relished by most farm animals. The greatest use made of it has been for dairy cows, thirty to fifty pounds being fed each cow daily at the North Dakota Experiment Station. It can be fed to beef cattle too, but they should be fed about half as much as dairy cattle. Young stock can be fed ensilage in proportion to their size. Some grain and hay should be fed with the ensilage. If the hay is alfalfa, the grain can be decreased and in some cases omitted.

Sheep relish a small amount of ensilage, two or three pounds a day is a good amount. Some feeders give as high as five or six pounds.

Horses can be fed ten to fifteen lbs. of ensilage a day. It has a good deal the same effect on them as pasture. Hogs like a little ensilage and especially so if it contains a good deal of corn. Ensilage is a bulky food a good deal like pasture in its effect on animals. It is important that it be free from mould as this causes trouble. Horses should not be fed ensilage that has been frozen, though with other stock it seems to be all right provided it is thawed out before feeding.

Three silos are in use at the North Dakota Experiment Station. Good results have been secured in the feeding of the ensilage.

**Cutting Ensilage.**  
Ensilage should be cut short. Half to three quarters of an inch is better than longer cuts. The fine cut ensilage will pack better, which means better keeping and it also feeds better. It takes more power to cut into short lengths.

## MAY SEARCH FOR GOLD DEPOSIT

Mandan, N. D., Aug. 9.—Relative to the Medora gold story and the tale of Joe Goose, one of the old-timers in this section was in the city and confirmed a part of the story. The person was an intimate friend of H. S. Parkin, an old rancher and Indian trader of Cannon Ball.


H. S. Parkin used to tell how the Indians often came to his trading post with buckskin pouches containing gold nuggets. The Indians told of getting the gold along a creek in the Badland country near the Little Missouri river. Another legend of precious metals found in the badland country, handed down from the early days, is that of Captain Fisk, who, in the early '80's with a detachment of soldiers, explored the Little Missouri. Frank Roby of Mandan then staked Captain Fisk, who had prepared a chart showing the location of a rich platinum deposit. Although a long search was made for the lode later, the chart had been lost and it could not be found.

The Badlands of North Dakota are simply the northern section of the South Dakota Black Hills. While state geologists at the University of North Dakota assert that a study of the physical formations of nature in the state would indicate the opposite, it might be possible to find minerals.

That the old Indian, Joe Goose, who died last week on the reservation, made annual trips to the Badlands and always returned with gold, is another indication. Frank Wagner, to whom the old Indian scout confided his secrets, is reticent, but it is understood that several parties are contemplating a prospect trip through the Medora country.
