Farmers are reminded of the danger of death from asphyxiation during the filling of the silo. This subject was recently discussed at a medical conference at Grand Forks. Large amounts of carbon dioxide are produced in the silo from green crop and may collect in dangerous quantities if conditions become favorable. To avoid such an accumulation of the gas, the doors should be left open as long as possible. Men should not stay in the silo when the blower is not running, and especially they should not sit or lie on fresh silage. If the work has been interrupted for any length of time, men should not again enter the silo until the blower has been running for a few minutes. This removes the dangerous gases. In the case of a pit silo, men should never remain in the silo when the blower is not running, and the blower should be started before anyone enters the silo.

Miss Sexton spent Sunday with friends at Devils Lake.

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
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
