Department of Agriculture, Office of the Secretary, Washington, D. C., Oct. 1, 1915. Sealed proposals to be received until 2 p. m., November 5, 1915, for furnishing all material and performing all labor necessary in the construction of an enclosure on the Sully's Hill National Park in the State of North Dakota, said enclosure to be constructed in a workmanlike manner and in conformity with the specifications and requirements of the Department of Agriculture. Each bidder must submit bids for the fence complete and in place and at a stipulated price per rod based on the construction of six (6) miles, more or less, of fencing, including gates and any necessary small enclosures. A certified check for the sum of \$500.00, payable to A. Zappone, Disbursing Clerk, must accompany each bid as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into a contract with the Department of Agriculture and execute a suitable bond for the faithful performance of the work in constructing such enclosure; said enclosure to be fully completed and ready for acceptance on or before July 1, 1916. Copies of the specifications, together with a map showing the location of the fence, will be procured by addressing a request to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., or may be examined at the Post-Office at Devils Lake, North Dakota.

passed by conflicting legal demands on his conduct. For instance newspaper publishers have found a demand in Iowa for Sunday newspapers, yet a law forbids publishing a newspaper on Sunday in that state. If the laws were observed, no place for amusement, picture shows, theatres, baseball parks or summer parks would be open on Sunday. The law says no dainties nor luxuries may be purchased on Sundays, nor is any street car allowed to run on the Sabbath. There is a question that a railroad train may be run through the state legally on Sunday, but it is certain that a man may not purchase a cigar nor a woman a piece of chewing gum on that day. The law forbids a woman offering prizes at card parties, and boys are not allowed to purchase nor smoke cigarettes. The law also forbids trusts or business combinations in the state. In spite of these laws, however, public opinion in many towns demands the theatre remain open on Sunday, baseball is played, summer parks run and even the big state fair was open on the Sabbath. The passage of laws is not more important than the repeal of those that have become obsolete or which are nullified by public opinion. Having a law upon the books which cannot be enforced produces that great evil a disrespect for all laws. When the people realize that a law cannot be enforced, even if a majority seems to favor it, they should not allow themselves to be made the cats-paw of politicians, but should demand its immediate repeal.

## TELL THE SALESMEN

With the approach of the fall season the big jobbers and manufacturers will begin to send out their salesmen. Many of these salesmen are going to call on you, Mr. Retailer. Here are a few suggestions by which you might open the conversation with them:

Ask them what they will do to help you sell the goods they want you to buy.

Ask them what they will do to help advertise their goods in the newspapers of your city. If they reply No, ask them why not?

Tell them that it is necessary for them to create a demand in your city, among your customers, for their line of goods; otherwise you cannot push their line in preference to those manufacturers or jobbers who do create this demand.

Tell them the best way to create a demand is to advertise in the local newspapers; that your customers read the newspapers published here; that you yourself advertise in them; and that you are not willing to spend your money to make their particular brands popular in this town and later have them take the line away from you and give it to your competitor.

Tell them that you favor goods that are advertised in your local newspapers because you find it more profitable to do so.

This is a mighty good hand to hold. It should be a stand-pat one.


