

### MUSTLING THE CORN CROP.

The long sunshiny days of the North Dakota summer hasten the corn crop. This in a measure makes us for the shorter season. When the corn is given every advantage big yields of mature corn can be produced, the contestants in the Acre Yield contest securing yields of over 100 bushels of mature corn on an acre.

One of the most important things that can be done now to aid the corn crop is to keep it free from weeds. The weeds, after the same plant food, the same moisture and the same sunshine that the corn plant needs. Another big thing that will help the corn plant is shallow cultivation. Many of the corn roots run quite close to the surface and in a wet year they are still nearer the surface. The cutting of these roots by the cultivator delays the corn.—North Dakota Experiment Station.

### VINEGAR VERSUS BUGS.

For the housewife who dislikes the task of picking over greens of various kinds because of the numbers of tiny bugs which often cling to the leaves, here is a hint which may prove helpful: After picking off all dead leaves and other foreign matter, put a small quantity of vinegar, say a quarter of a cup, into the panful of water in which you rinse your greens, and you will be surprised to see how the little bugs will drop off into the vinegar-water. The acid of the vinegar seems to render them powerless to cling to the leaves, and thus water-cress, lettuce, spinach, dandelions and other greens may be quickly and easily cleaned of insects. I usually give the greens a final rinsing in clear water.—Woman's Home Companion.

### CAR LOAD LOTS.

The carload lot is the unit in handling a great many things on the market as well as on the railroad. In planning the production it will often be advantageous to plan to have a carload of hogs or a carload of cattle or a carload of potatoes or whatever the product. In this way the lowest transportation charges are secured and the price secured is often better than if a smaller quantity had been sold.


