


Frank H. Hyland for State Senator



I came to this county fifteen years ago. The first four years I was here I was in the real estate business, besides handling what auction sales I could. During the time when I was in the real estate business and since I have been instrumental in bringing to this county about 80 families, most of whom are land owners and are now helping you and I build up this county and are aiding in paying its taxes. Through literature and personal visits I have advertised Ramsey County from Ohio to the Rocky Mountains, and have boosted for this county whenever and wherever I went.

I believe that any unbiased person, that knows, will admit that I have done more to help build up this county in any one month since I came than my opponent has in all the years he has been here. There is a great difference between building for the general public and building for one's self.

I tried to represent this county in the house of Representatives in 1911 and by your votes I was sent to represent you in the Senate during the session of 1913 and 1915. I did my very best to keep Ramsey county in the front ranks and have always felt that I had succeeded. The writer of the Legislative Manual, whom I had offended by cutting down his appropriation, was still kind enough to say of me that "I was an able debater, far sighted and sound in judgment, independent and absolutely honest and one of the most fearless men that was ever in the North Dakota Legislature."

I have been treated with the utmost consideration by presiding officers, and have been accorded service on the judiciary, state affairs, finance, ways and means, live stock, railroads, and many other committees. The last two sessions I was relied upon to look after the interests of the live stock breeders' association; the dairy interests and the interests of the pure seed grain growers.

I voted for the terminal elevator in 1911 and again in 1913. At the general election in 1914 Ramsey county voted almost unanimously in favor of the construction of a terminal elevator. As a member of the Senate I CERTAINLY WOULD HAVE VOTED FOR THE BILL but it was introduced and killed in the House. I also voted for the Plain State Hail Insurance Law and for the Ellingson Bonding Law which you have heard and read about.

I drew up and introduced the resolution under which North Dakota will get her share of the National appropriation for the improvement of the public roads. I also am the author of what has been known as "The Tax Shark Bill." Under the old law your lands went to a tax sale with only the description printed in one paper in the county. The remedy was to have the names appear with the description and to have list appear in the paper in every county having the largest circulation. Besides you are notified, personally, twice before the date of the tax sale. This has practically driven the tax shark out of existence and has saved thousands and thousands of dollars to the land owners. I was instrumental in the passage of the law prohibiting a commission being made on school books and school supplies, cutting down the number of legislative employees—eradicating the deadly disease of glanders and dourine in horses, tuberculosis in cattle and cholera in hogs, petition to the National congress to pass a law for the federal inspection and grading of grains. I secured the services of one of the Government experts and sent him to almost every place in the county to show people how to prepare the famous "sweet oats" the poison that has driven the gopher out of the county. I mention the above measures because they are things men following the profession of farming would be interested in.

My opponent is appealing to your votes and so am I. I could have had the endorsement of the Non-partisan League but I cannot see how any man can legislate, for all, openly and from an unbiased standpoint pledged to stand against one class for another. I will never sign any pledge that is not embodied in the constitution of my State or my Nation. I am not against the Non-partisan League. I will work for and support any measure that is for the everlasting good of the farmers of this county and will work against any measure that is not for your good and it will make no difference where the idea originates. I have worked all my life and have saved what I earned and what little I have in Ramsey county farm land. I have only two means; of making a living farming and auctioneering—both cement me to the farmer and the live-stock man.

If any man in this County has ever known of me being either dishonorable or dishonest I want you to vote against me,
