LARGE NUMBERS OF AMERICANS AT WORK IN ALBANIA

Under Direction of American Physicians and Red Cross Officials Women Physicians, Nurses, Field and Social Workers Engaged in Relief Work.

Durazzo, Albania, May 17, (By Mail).—Nearly a hundred American women physicians, nurses, fieldworkers and social workers are now at work in Albania under the direction of American physicians and Red Cross officers.

Twenty-three members of the Red Cross unit are at Tirana. Here an American dispensary has been set up and thousands of sick Albanians have been treated.

A hospital also has been established under American management at Tirana and in addition nurses visit hundreds of sick in their homes in the mountains.

Red Cross work of a similar nature is being carried on at Durazzo, Elbasan, Scitari, and another group of workers has been sent into the Argirocastro district to furnish emergency relief to Albanian-speaking Greeks.

Major Robert C. Denison, director of the Albanian unit, reports: "Nowhere in the Balkans is there greater need of medical, dental and clothing supplies and children's aid in Albania."

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TURK QUILTS MOSQUE OF ST. SOPHIA

Christian Architects Already Making Plans For Transformation of Church When Taken From Turks.

Constantinople, May 5.—(By Mail).—The faithful Turk does not visit the great Mosque of St. Sophia as frequently as he used to for he considers it a foregone conclusion that St. Sophia will become a Christian church as it was in the fifth and sixth centuries.

Christian architects already have visited the mosque and are making their plans for the transformation of the church when it is taken from the Turks.

The devil's face in the marble facings under the big dome and the alleged impression in stone of the hand of Memet, the Conqueror also will be retained as a reminder of the tenth of May, 1453 when Memet climbed upon a heap of Christian corpses in the church Constantine built and smote the wall with his hand still bloody from the bodies of the Christians slain.

There is a possibility that the conversion of St. Sophia for Christian worship may meet with some opposition from Great Britain.

Avenge Blanquet's Death With 75 Lives

Vera Cruz, Mexico, June 1.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press).—The death of seventy-five defenseless passengers was one phase of the revenge taken by the rebel bands under nominal command of Felix Diaz for the death of Aureliano Blanquet and Francisco Alvarez.

A train on the Inter-oceanic line, bearing persons being armed only with instruments of labor was dynamited between Pino and Las Vigas, the great number of the passengers killed by rifle fire and their bodies, burned with the living wounded, turned when the train was fired.

Within a few days a party of bandits, commanded by the Arellano brothers, burned a large part of the village of Tiapocoyan, causing an undetermined number of casualties.

The only military success registered was the attack on a military train near Tierra Blanca, on the Isthmus Railway, at a point known as "Devil's Backbone," by forces under the rebel leaders, Villenas and Lagunes.

In addition thousands of ordinary American plows are being shipped into Macedonia. To pull these plows the Bulgarians finally agreed after much discussion to deliver seven hundred draught animals per week to the Greek government for the ten thousands of animals taken by the Bulgarian army in Greece during the war.
