8,500 ENGINEERS AND FIREMEN TO JOIN SWITCHMEN IN STRIKE

INTRODUCE BILL BAR SOCIALISTS N. Y. POLITICS

Two Bills Designed On Recommendation of Judiciary Assembly Committee To Bar Socialist Party From Participating In Politics In New York State Introduced Today

(By The Associated Press.) Albany, April 7.—Two bills designed to carry out the recommendation of the assembly judiciary committee for barring the Socialist party of America from participation of politics in New York state, were introduced in the legislature today.

One measure is intended to require the attorney general of the state to begin an action in the appellate division department for a judicial determination of the questions. Whether the "principles, doctrines, or policy" of the socialist party, "if carried into effect would destroy, submerge, or endanger the government of the state and nation."

The companion measure is designed to amend the public office law relative to qualification of persons to hold office and provide for exclusion from public office or preventing of the exercising of office duties.

Will Strike In Defiance of Union Officials — Freight Traffic Through The Chicago District Seriously Restricted—Food and Fuel Supplies In Chicago Reported Running Low—Nearly 25,000 Stock Yards Employes Thrown Out Of Work.

Chicago, April 7.—Representatives of 8,500 members of the brotherhood of locomotive firemen and engine men employed in the Chicago switch district, today have defied their union officials and voted to join the unauthorized switchmen's strike, called nearly a week ago. Freight traffic through the Chicago district already was restricted seriously and strike leaders and railroad officials were agreed that if the force of the strike was authentic, traffic would virtually be brought to a standstill. The engine and firemen declared they would not work with "scabs," as they term loyal union men who were to be used to break the strike and also demand increased wages. Engineers are paid \$5.76 a day and are demanding \$1.80 an hour; the firemen are paid from \$4.18 to \$4.48 a day and demand \$1 an hour.

It was reported the supply of several foods and fuel were beginning to run low in Chicago, and nearly 25,000 employes had been thrown out of work at the stock yards by the shortage of receipts of cattle. It was stated that unless receipts of live stock were resumed shortly, approximately 50,000 men would be idle. The pens at the stock yards virtually were empty yesterday. The strikers claimed early today that 16,000 men already were out in this district and that by night 25,000 would be on strike. Railroad officials, while not denying the seriousness of the situation said about 2,500 switchmen and yardmen were out.

INDICATIONS OF "RED TERROR" IN ESSEN; COMMUNISTS ADVANCE

MANDAN FRIENDS GIVE BANQUET "BILL" LANGER

Langer Declares State Does Not Need Men From Other States To Come Here And Tell State How To Run Affairs In North Dakota—Miss Nielson Says Women Are Backing Langer.

Bismarck, N. D., April 7.—"We do not need McLaurin of North Carolina, Walter Thomas Mills, of New Zealand, Roy Lance of Utah, Eugene V. Debs or Bill Haywood of the federal penitentiary or any other imported socialists to tell us how to run our state of North Dakota. There are men in this audience, lots of men in Mandan there are plenty of men right over here in the railroad shops who are capable of holding us over in Bismarck and running this state; men who are honest and sincere, men who stand for justice and right; men who shoot square and who are not socialists," said Attorney General William Langer last evening in his brief talk at the testimonial banquet tendered him by Mandan citizens as a material evidence of their good will and backing him in his race for governor and of their appreciation of his fight against Towlesism.

Judge Hanley called first upon Judge S. L. Nichols, who recalled Langer's singlehanded scrap for the nomination for state's attorney of Morton County and his utterance "how many of these fellows voted for him then." He recalled the fight Langer made against the Towlesite opposition in the general election on the platform of law and order. "Bill Langer had the courage of his convictions. He was not then and is not now afraid to confront the Towlesite and the right as he sees the right."

2,000 Communists Have Crossed Rhine Into The British Zone of Occupation—1200 More Expected To Arrive—Revolt In Ruhr Valley Nearly At End—Situation In Ruhr Valley Is Bad, Living Conditions Almost Unbearable.

Coblenz, April 7.—2,000 communists have crossed the Rhine into the British zone of occupation and had been interned. 1,200 more are expected to arrive today. Flight of a large number of communists into occupied territory is considered an indication that the revolt in the Ruhr district is nearly at an end. Bochum was still in control of communists late yesterday, and expected a big fight there. The situation in the Ruhr Valley is bad, and living conditions are almost unbearable. A railroad strike at Essen is reported and no trains are running. Gelsenkirchen, north of here, and Dortmund and Schwerte, to the east, were captured today and occupied by advancing government troops.

Much fighting is reported in the Ruhr area. There are indications of the "Red terror" in Essen, under the direction of Red officers.

Ray Soen Dies In New Rockford Hospital

New Rockford, April 7.—Ray Soen, who shot himself Sunday evening after an attempt to kill Miss Harriett Carlson, 22 years old of Sheyenne, North Dakota, died at the hospital here today. Miss Carlson, who was shot in the arm, is recovering. Rejection of Soen's attentions is said to have been the cause of the shooting.

Prince Of Wales Arrives San Diego

San Diego, Calif., April 7.—Edward Prince of Wales and his wife, the British throne arrived at point Loma today, where the cruiser Renown awaited. Many events are planned here for today and tomorrow.

MILWAUKEE RE-ELECTS MAYOR HOEN

Complete, But Unofficial, Returns From Milwaukee City Election Show That Mayor Daniel Hoen Was Re-elected Over Clifton Williams, Nonpartisan Candidate.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 7.—Complete, but unofficial returns from the Milwaukee city election show that Mayor Daniel Hoen, socialist, was re-elected over Clifton Williams, present city attorney, and running on the nonpartisan ticket, by a majority of 3,373. Under a new law, Hoen's term will run for four years. Hoen led his ticket and was the only one of the three present officials to pull through. His vote was 40,604 and Williams, 37,221.

In the convention for delegates to the Republican National convention those approved by Senator La Follette were leading, though only a few hundred precincts had been heard from.

GEN. ROMANOVSKY SHOT THRU HEART, AT RUSSIAN EMBASSY

General Denekine Was In Company With General Romanovsky At Embassy—Murderer Not Found, and As No One Saw The Tragedy It Is Not Likely Will Be—Denekine Is Fugitive On Board a British Ship.

(By The Associated Press.) Constantinople, Tuesday April 7

General Denekine, former commander of the anti-Bolshevik forces in Southern Russia arrived here last night, and today is a fugitive on board the British warship. Immediately after he landed he went to the Russian Embassy with General Romanovsky, his former chief of staff, and it was while he was there that the latter was assassinated. General Denekine is believed to be in danger, because of the high feeling that prevails among Russian forces here and he went on board the ship under guard of soldiers. The General's murderer has not been apprehended and there is little chance as attaches at the Russian Embassy say nobody saw the tragedy.

General Denekine and General Romanovsky were talking with Prince Gergarin and several other Russians in the sitting room at the Embassy and the latter left to arrange for a motor car to bring his luggage from the steamer. A few minutes later revolver shots were heard, and General Romanovsky was found in a dying condition in the billiard room. He was unable to speak when friends reached him, having been shot through the heart and windpipe. General Romanovsky was unpopular with the officers and soldiers and many charges were made against him but General Denekine refused to dismiss him.

FLIRTATION MURDER BEING INVESTIGATED

Hotel Managers Will Determine Whether The Killing of Traverse Walsh By Joseph Mane Was Justifiable—Mane Says Walsh Flirted With His Wife.

Chicago, April 7.—Managers of the Chicago's six leading hotels were selected as a coroner's jury today to determine whether an alleged street flirtation is sufficient reason for killing a man. The hotel managers will investigate the death of Traverse Walsh, knocked down by Joseph Mane, 120-pound pianist, after Walsh was said to flirt with Mrs. Mane.

Walsh's skull was fractured and he died shortly after being knocked down. In accordance with a jury, Peter Hoffman said hotel managers came in contact with all classes of people, and would be "supposed to have intimate knowledge of men who were flirts." It will decide whether Walsh was such a person or whether it was a killing justifiable for an alleged flirtation or insult to another man's wife.

"BIG FOUR" LEAD IN NEW YORK JOHNSON STILL LEADS IN MICH.

New York's "Big Four" Defeated Uninstructed Delegates of the Former State Senator Bennett, Pledged To Senator Johnson In Yesterday's Primary—Returns In Michigan Today Puts Johnson Still In Lead.

New York, April 7.—New York state's "big four" defeated the uninstructed delegates of the former State Senator William Bennett, pledged to the presidential candidacy of Senator Hiram Johnson, of California, in yesterday's primary, according to virtually complete returns early today.

With only 126 election districts out of 2,571 in the state missing, the vote for the "big four" was 73,510 to 25,561. Scattering returns from up state where the vote was also light, indicated that they won over Bennett by a greater margin than in this city. No candidate favorable to Senator Johnson was elected in any of the twelve congressional districts here, where the contests were waged.

Detroit, April 7.—Belated returns on Monday's preference primaries coming in slow from the sparsely settled districts of the state added but few votes early today to the total already compiled from approximately two-thirds of the precincts. These figures gave Senator Hiram Johnson 42,251 votes over Major General Leonard Wood on the Republican ticket, and Herbert Hoover on the Democratic ticket was 4,466 over Governor Edward I. Edwards, of New Jersey. The vote stood on Republican for 1661 precincts out of 3150: Johnson, 124,949; Wood, 82,698; Hoover, 44,229; Hoover, 40,624. Democrats for 1,472 precincts: Hoover, 17,988; Edwards, 13,128; Bryan, 11,641; Palmer, 7,570.
