

How to Vote Right on the Initiated and Referred Laws

The anti-Red Flag law was initiated by petition and will therefore be submitted to the voters on the official ballot on June 30th as an initiated measure. To vote against the Red Flag and Townleyism, you must vote "yes" on this law. The other three laws to be voted on were passed by the legislature and are referred to the people by petitions circulated by the Independent Voters' Association. To vote against Townleyism, you must vote "no" on each of these.

Bridge Tender's Body Recovered From River

Wiliston, N. D., June 16.—The body of Peter J. Milkoski, who was drowned in the Missouri river when he fell from the Great Northern railroad at Snowden, May 21, was recovered about a mile below Mondak on Saturday.

Coroner Gustafson of Fairview was called but no inquest was held as the cause of his death was purely accidental as was shown by testimony of the witnesses. Upon investigation of the body it was found that several ribs have been broken and the body was badly bruised, which probably was caused by it striking the iron railing of the bridge in the fall. The body was prepared for burial and was shipped to his former home in Minnesota.
