How The Million Dollar Band Got Its Name—Bachman

Every one wants to know how Harold Bachman's Band came to be known as The Million Dollar Band. Mr. Bachman tells the story as follows: "It was on Christmas day, 1917, that the 116th Engineer band was doing its best to cheer up the lonely soldiers of the 51st Division, who were spending their first Christmas away from home. General Hunter J. Liggett was the guest of honor at a celebration for the men at which this band furnished most of the music. Noting the cheering effect which the music had on the men, the General paid close attention to the program which Director Bachman had arranged, especially for Christmas day. At the close of one number General Liggett's chief of staff came to the band, and after presenting the compliments of the General to the director, said: "General Liggett wishes me to inform you that in all his forty-one years experience he has never heard a better band in the American Army." This compliment must have inspired the band members to even greater efforts, for after the next number General Liggett turned to Colonel Walker, commander of the 116th Engineers, and exclaimed, "Colonel, that band is WORTH A MILLION DOLLARS TO THE UNITED STATES."

The compliment seemed to please the officers of the regiment nearly as much as the band members. They began to talk of their "Million Dollar Band" and the name stuck until the organization became known by that name whenever it appeared.

A good many people have said the same thing about this band since General Liggett first nick-named it. The Minneapolis Journal of November 12, 1920, says, "The Million Dollar Dispenses Jazz Music at the rate of a Million Dollars Worth a minute." in referring to the big ball, given in Minneapolis for delegates to the first National Convention of The American Legion at which this band was a feature attraction.

Harold Bachman will present the Million Dollar Band at the Wood Lake summer resort on Wednesday, June 23. There will be a dance on the same evening in the Wood Lake dance pavilion.
