Martin Hoghaug, whose appointment as tax supervisor of Ramsey county, automatically expired under state laws, July 1st, has been made district tax supervisor under Tax Commissioner Wallace, who has made public a list of his new corps of assistants. The supervisors will have charge of all taxes assessments in the sixth tax district of the state.

Other appointees named by Commissioner Wallace, are: John P. Simon of Grand Forks, C. C. Talbott of Forbes, Jesse Bergster of Jamestown,

Martin Selander of Minot and J. D. Harris of Manning.

The appointees must qualify for office before July 12th. They will be set to work at once checking up income tax returns, according to Commissioner Wallace.

Ex-President Of U. S. Is Laudatory to North Dakota

Boy Scout Band Is A Big Feature Of The Day

William Howard Taft, ex-president of the United States, was a guest of the city Saturday, and more directly of the Devils Lake Chautauqua association. Mr. Taft delivered the address of the day at City park in the big auditorium Saturday afternoon before a crowd that filled every available seat in the big structure.

Business men here turned out in large numbers Friday evening to greet the notable visitor on his arrival, but he failed to appear. In the meantime the Boy Scout band furnished the public with an excellent brief concert. Again in the morning, the same big crowd was at the Great Northern depot to greet the great man—again he failed to appear. A luncheon planned at the Elks' club home Saturday morning was enjoyed by business men—without the guest of the day. Nevertheless, a large delegation unexpectedly met Mr. Taft when he arrived shortly after noon over the Aneta line.

Mr. Taft spoke along his well known lines, touching upon the League of Nations program of the government and a score of other major subjects, all problems of the people of the United States, in his address in the afternoon.

The speaker did not fail to compliment his listeners on the wonderful reception accorded him through his North Dakota itinerary, and particularly in Devils Lake.

Applause after applause greeted the speaker through his address.

AT THE GRAND

Building an American boarding school parlor within the gold-fretted walls of an East Indian palace is done only in the "movies," of course, and then as a matter of efficiency. Such a set within a set was constructed by Metro technicians for "Dangerous to Men." Viola Dana's picture to be shown at the Grand theatre for two days beginning Thursday.

CANNOT BUY HUSBAND

Russian Girl Offers Rubles in Vain at Manila.

Eager to Escape Terrors of Russia Girls Go as Stowaways to Philippines.

Manila, P. I.—Some of the Russian girls who were disappointed in not obtaining American soldier husbands at Vladivostok disguised themselves in American uniforms, stowed away on transports, and came to Manila, so eager were they to escape from the turmoil and suffering which had prevailed in Siberia almost since the beginning of the war. These stowaways were turned over to the authorities here to be deported to the country whence they came. Several of them were married at the pier while awaiting to be put on board a transport for the voyage back to Vladivostok, which made them American citizens and gave them the right to remain here.

One of these stowaways clad in male attire, when about to be placed on board a transport for deportation with several thousand rubles in her hands, appealed to the crowd at the pier for some man to marry her and save her from what she said would be certain death if she were returned to Siberia. The Russian money, which is now of little value, appeared to have no influence toward bringing forth a husband for the woman, and she was sent back to Siberia.

Three hundred or more Russian "war brides," who have come here from Siberia with their soldier husbands are to be sent to the United States by the government as soon as transportation is available. Army authorities decided that they, with few exceptions, should be sent to the United States and there distributed among the army camps and posts, where quarters are available for married enlisted men.

PATHS AS SIDE STREETS



There are few streets in Ypres today. Only paths worn by hundreds of refugee families guide the way of the visitor through the ruins of the city. This was once one of the principal side streets of the town; today it is only a path through the wilderness. The path leads from the old cathedral, seen in the background, to the American Red Cross colony erected to care for the hundreds of refugees returning to the city without homes or shelter. These barrack buildings furnished the only shelter obtainable for hundreds of people during the cold winter months and until reconstruction could begin this spring.

STUDENTS APPROVE KISSING

Senior Class at Columbia University Votes Dancing Most Popular Indoor Sport.

New York.—Dancing was first as a popular indoor sport in a vote of members of the senior class at Columbia university. Kissing was unanimously approved, although only half of the class admitted indulgence in the practice. The favorite answer to the question, "Why do you kiss?" was "Nobody knows and nobody seems to care." Water was voted to be the favorite drink, with whisky second. Football and tennis were voted to be the favorite outdoor sports. The vote showed that the class has nearly three times as many Republicans as Democrats.

Man Baptized in Coffin Dead in Kentucky

Hickman, Ky.—Paul Eldridge, who was baptized in a coffin here, is dead. He was too ill to be carried to the church, so his family made an improvised baptistry of a coffin, which they lined with oil cloth, and successfully baptized him. Elder E. L. Miley of the Christian church performed the rite. A wife and several children survive.

Why Farmers Go to the Poorhouse.

Glenville, W. Va.—Frank Johnson, farmer, who lost his spectacles in a sack of potatoes last fall, is again in possession of them, having found them in a barrel of seed potatoes from a mail order house. Last fall he sold his entire crop at the prevailing market price of \$2 a bushel. When he emptied the barrel of seed potatoes, for which he paid \$5 a bushel, he found his spectacle case among the tubers.

OVER 2,000 HAIL CLAIMS ON FILES

Bismarck, N. D., July 7.—Two thousand or more claims to collect hail insurance under the state hail insurance law, according to C. E. Van Horne, of the hail inspection department, mostly from the northern part of the state. A few claims have, it was stated, come from nearly every part of the state.

"There has not been as much land withdrawn this year as last, from the operation of the law," Mr. Van Horne declared, in commenting upon the workings of the statute.

Woman Given First Vote For President

SAN FRANCISCO.—The first vote to be cast for a woman for the Democratic presidential nomination came at the convention here from the Kentucky delegation.

Chairman Stanley cast it for Miss Laura Clay, one of the women of the delegation.

So far as convention observers could remember it was the first vote cast for a woman in the conventions of either of the two great parties.
