POPULAR PLAY COMING MONDAY

Birth of a Nation Will Be At The Grand Theatre

The magnitude of David W. Griffith's feat in staging "The Birth of a Nation," which will appear at the Grand theatre Monday, afternoon and evening, is almost appalling—at least to the devotees of the older forms of theatrical entertainment. It has also created a tremendous sensation because of its vaster and more forceful treatment of the theme of Thomas Dixon's "The Clansman," which both as book and play, created the greatest furors of the last decade. The great deeds of the Civil War and the horrors of Reconstruction are made to live again and the nation reborn is apotheosized. Mr. Griffith, pioneer among directors, managed this stupendous achievement without the aid of dialogue or speech, for motion pictures with music and effects tell vividly this thrilling tale of fifty years ago.

A complete musical company of ten persons will aid in presenting the wonderful picture at the Grand.


