## SOLDIERS ARE OUT OF GAME

### Government For bids Army Men From Entering Politics

Washington, D. C.—Army officers and others connected with the military establishment are prohibited, under and order issued by Secretary Baker, from taking "any active part in political campaign," or from "using their official positions to influence the result of an election," Secretary Baker said the order was not directed at Major General Wood, who sought the nomination as the Republican candidate for the presidency, and who since has promised his active support to Senator Harding. Mr. Baker explained that General Wood's activities in politics had been with his full knowledge and consent, and that the general's position had been exceptional.

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
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
