DEMI SURGERY BY GILBERTSON

Modern Practice In The Field of Undertaking Explained

E. W. Gilbertson has returned from Chicago, where he has been since the fore part of August, taking a course in Demi surgery as well as other studies relative to his business and profession as an undertaker. For the benefit of the World readers, Mr. Gilbertson has defined demi surgery. He said:

"We are called on frequently to care for cancerous cases where some parts of the face may be gone, the chin, nose and in a great many cases

the lips and parts of the jaw. In accidents where the body becomes badly mangled, especially in railroad accidents where the head and face may be crushed demi surgery can be demonstrated to its best effect. In case of an explosion or fire, when the face may have become badly burned or charred, it is now possible to restore that face so that it would be difficult matter for even an expert to tell that artificial means had been used.

"I assisted in preparing a body that was taken from a state institution in Chicago, where the nose and practically the entire jaw was gone. The man was taken to his home where he remained two days before the funeral, not even his wife or children knew or discovered that demi surgery had been used in preparing the body so that it could be viewed by them and friends.

A good city will do more to keep the boys at home than good advice.
