

REAL ROOSEVELT ABHORRED WILSON AND HIS WORKS

Yet Democratic Candidate for Vice Presidency Standers Great Leader's Memory.

MAKING FUTILE ATTEMPT TO WIN ON OLD ISSUES

Fifth Cousin Removed Roosevelt Not Able to Convince Followers of T. R. by Specious Arguments.

Tearing the country as a candidate for Vice President, Franklin D. Roosevelt is vainly endeavoring to invoke the progressive spirit of 1912 in support of Wilsonism and the election of the Democratic ticket in November.

What would the real Roosevelt—Theodore Roosevelt—the immortal T. R.—say to his followers were he alive today?

Gone, he left burning words which tell all too plainly what his attitude would be at this time.

He abhorred Wilsonism, just as he abhorred Danielism, with both of which Franklin D. Roosevelt has been identified as an under Secretary.

Condemned Wilsonism.

Theodore Roosevelt condemned Wilsonism and the whole Wilson administration in unsparring terms.

Read anew what he said at Cooper Union on November 8, 1916:

"I have been assailed because I have criticized Mr. Wilson. I have not said one thing of him that was not absolutely accurate and truthful.

"I have not said one thing of him which I did not deem it necessary to say because of the vital interests of this republic.

"I have criticized him because I believe he has dragged in the dust what was most sacred in our past and has jeopardized the most vital hopes of our future.

"I criticize him now because he has adroitly and cleverly and with sinister ability appealed to all that is weakest and most unworthy in the American character; and also because he has adroitly and cleverly and with sinister ability sought to mislead many men and women who are neither weak nor unworthy, but who have been misled by a shadow dance of words.

"He has made our statesmanship a thing of empty eloquence.

"He has covered his fear of standing for the right behind a veil of rhetorical phrases.

"He has wrapped the true heart of the nation in a spangled shroud of rhetoric.

"He has kept the eyes of the people dazzled so that they know not what is real and what is false. So that they turn, bewildered, unable to discern the difference between the glitter that veils evil and the stark realities of courage and honesty, of truth and strength.

"In the face of the world he has covered this nation's face with shame as with a garment."

So much for Theodore Roosevelt's opinion of Wilson and Wilsonism in support of which Franklin D. Roosevelt, life-long Democrat, would now invoke the progressive spirit of 1912!

Abhorred Danielism.

And what did Theodore Roosevelt think of Daniels' administration of the Navy Department of which the Democrat, Franklin D. Roosevelt, has been a more or less conspicuous factor and part?

In a speech on "Americanism and National Defense" at Chicago, October 26, 1916, Theodore Roosevelt said:

"More harm has been done to the navy by the politicians in power during the last three years than in the preceding thirty. Whatever good has been accomplished in the navy during the last three years has been done by naval officers, who, in most cases, have been snubbed and punished for their proposals as long as it was safe to do so; whereas Mr. Daniels now turns and claims credit for what was thus steeled upon him.

"In short, throughout President Wilson's term there has been neglect or positive misadministration in connection with departmental organizations in navy yards, armaments, ships and torpedoes, and in all other matters connected with the efficiency of the fleet and the maintenance of its officers and men.

"The activity and energy of the Navy Department under President Wilson has been primarily concentrated upon schemes aimed at vote-getting or self-promotion."

This, then, is what Theodore Roosevelt thought of the administration of the Department from which Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democrat and supporter of Wilsonism, has just been elected Vice President. And he was representative of 1912. Remember that the real Roosevelt, only to have the Democrats put in to power and make Wilsonism a fact.

Will we let them go the way of their fathers, mothers, sisters, and brothers? Surely not!

Only debased peoples or peoples who do not know of these conditions could permit that.

There are those who hoped a mandate would be established and that the U. S. government would assume police duty and care for these unfortunate innocent peoples; but we have not seen fit to take a mandate. This is likely a wise insight. A mandate means European policies and might involve the U. S. later in war.

The result is that what is NOBODY'S Business is not done.

The U. S. has recognized that Armenia is a republic, but the recognition is empty. It is like saying "How do you do" to a drowning man.

Political machinery moves slowly—in time things will adjust. At the same time HUNGER MOVES FAST CHILDREN MUST EAT and they must be CLOTHED—and the BEST mandate in the world is SYMPATHY AND UNDERSTANDING AND THE THINGS THAT GO WITH THESE—SOMETHING TO EAT AND SOMETHING TO WEAR!

Remembering that 250,000 of these cold hungry orphans are depending on the United States, and that of this number 1500 are depending on the good offices of the people of North Dakota, we have seen fit to ask the citizens of this splendid state to rise to this occasion. OCTOBER 4, WILL BE RELIEF DAY. Last year we fed 1000 of these people. This year we are better able to feed more. Our harvests are better than last year—the war clouds have gone by—our own boys at home again with us. Are we to be happy and contented while our neighbors die of unavoidable starvation?

Some want to bring these orphans to America and adopt them. This was done in case of French war orphans. But—the Armenian boys and girls are not needed in America. They are needed to build up their own lands. Let us adopt them, if we will, but let them stay in Armenia. We can feed them there. It can be done on \$5.00 per month which is much cheaper than it could be done here to say nothing of their transportation, etc.

When the Armenian republic is able to stand on its own legs and be able to have the rights of other nations of people then will come the end for ever of the generation-long Armenian and Syrian problem. They are a thrifty people and will be well able to take care of themselves, once they are free from the despoiling hand of the Turk. I am as eager as you to have that day come. But they are more eager than any of us! Those of us who went through the Great War and suffered what Humanity might be a more noble thing we cannot rest, till this present nightmare is wrapt away from our eyes. What do we say?

If you agree don't stand idly by but lend a hand. Go to your fraternity your church, your lodge, grange, your club—YOURSELF, adopt for the year one to ten of these orphans. It will cost you but five dollars per month or sixty dollars a year to give life to one of these boys or girls.

Last year not one dollar raised in North Dakota went for overhead expenses. Every cent you gave went directly in to the buying of food or clothes for the suffering people. This year the same policy is to be pursued. Your gifts will arrive.

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SURRAT SAYS WHEAT YIELD WILL BE BIG

Field Agent Sets North Dakota Production High

Grand Forks, N. D., Sept. 2, 1920.

The North Dakota wheat Production outlook for September 1st is estimated to be 70,574,000 bushels compared to 53,613,000 bushels last year, and the five year average of 85,912,000 bushels. The total production of wheat for the United States is estimated at 770,000,000 bushels compared to 941,000,000 last year, an dthe average of 822,000,000 bushels.

North Dakota flax production outlook on September 1st is placed at 4,677,000 bushels compared with 3,800,000 last year, and the average of 6,329,000 bushels. United States flax production is estimated to be 11,821,000 bushels compared with 8,919,000 last year, and the average of 12,900,000 bushels.

PAVING IS TO COME AT LAST

Contractors Expected To Begin Laying Top Today

The laying of a top dressing on the many blocks of cement already spread over Devils Lake streets, is expected to begin today, according to representatives of the Haggart Construction company holding the general contract for the work here.

After months of what to the public appeared needless delay, the work is now being pushed at a rapid rate with indications pointing to a speedy completion of at least the business streets before snow flies.

Superintendent Hill declared that once the top dressing is being spread, the public will begin to get the benefit of it as only approximately twenty-four hours is necessary after "pouring" before traffic is permitted.
