"Hard Boiled" Smith Is Said To Be Free Again

LEAVENWORTH, Kansas.—"Hard-boiled" Frank H. Smith, notorious prison master in an A. E. F. prison camp in France, and today rumored to have been pardoned by the president, was still on "home" parole at Painesville, Ohio, as far as Leavenworth prison officials were concerned.

Lieut. Colonel Sherburne Whipple, adjutant of the disciplinary barracks here, did not know whether Smith was still under obligation to report to military authorities once a month.

According to information here, Smith was court-martialed and dishonorably discharged for brutality while a lieutenant in the army. He was last reported to be living at his home in Painesville, Ohio, under a "home parole."

BILL HAYWOOD MUST SERVE A PEN SENTENCE

Court Of Appeals Has Upheld Sentence Passed

Chicago, Oct. 6.—The United States Court of Appeals for the Chicago district has upheld the conviction of "Big Bill" Haywood and 92 other I. W. W. on charges growing out of alleged violation of war time acts.

The case has been before the court of appeals for nearly two years. The men were convicted on four counts but only two upheld. Judge Landis in his court sentenced the men on each count, the sentences to run concurrently.

Haywood was given 20 years. The men out on bond will be ordered to appear immediately and be taken to the Leavenworth penitentiary.


