Cathro, manager of the state banking institution and also a member of the board of directors of the North Dakota Bankers' association in private life.

The Bank of North Dakota opened for business July 28, 1919, and publishes its statement monthly as of the fifteenth day of the month.

WITH THE Y.M.C.A. BOYS

Professor C. E. Zink, physical director of the Grand Forks Y. M. C. A., and Secretary Conrad of the Ramsey County Y. M. C. A., have just completed a program of physical and recreational activities in several of the public schools. Mr. Zink and Mr. Conrad have visited six of the stronger schools and have approached this phase of the recreational work by developing mass games, stunts and athletic work for outdoor use, and also spent quite considerable time in each school developing indoor games and stunts, together with community shown an eager desire for this work singing. All the schools visited have and also manifested a splendid spirit and cooperation for carrying on the work.

The purpose of this movement is to awaken the play life instincts, and following up with this will develop a county athletic meet for next spring in one big event during the month of May. Mr. Zink held a conference in the High school gym Wednesday evening and many of the older boys of the various schools that had been visited were present and received special instruction for carrying on this work. During the latter part of November there will be an older boys' conference at Grand Forks at which time a water carnival and other special events and athletic activities will be staged. This is a new movement to extend this part of the program into the schools of the county. Mr. Zink will be here from time to time to help develop this athletic and recreational program. The Grand Forks Y. M. C. A. and the Ramsey County Association are cooperating that this much needed work may be carried into the rural districts and thoroughly developed.

Boys who promised to become leaders in developing this program will do well to keep in touch with Mr. Zink any young men that feel they need as he is anxious and ready to help special coaching in carrying on this work.
