Old Indian Claims
FORT YATES, N. D., Oct. 9.—Estimate of the pony claims of the Standing Rock Indian reservation, taken to the council at Crow Creek total nearly \$225,000. The Indians also claim there is due them an amount equivalent to \$10 a year from 1868 to 1890, which they claim was promised them by the treaty of 1868.

Auto Accident Kills.
MANDAN, N. D., Oct. 4.—Earl Young, aged 35, a well-known Oliver county farmer, was found dead Saturday afternoon on a cross road 8 miles west of Fort Clark. Mr. Young was pinned beneath his overturned car and it is believed that he had been dead several hours. Funeral was held yesterday afternoon.

Honor For Veterans
BEACH, N. D.—Beach citizens celebrated the return of an overseas veteran on Monday last when Joe Lenroe returned to the city after three years spent in service overseas.

Editor's Wife Dies
DRAKE, N. D.—Mrs. J. W. R. H. DeLa, well known resident of this section of the state is dead at Drake. Her husband, who survives, now principal of the Drake schools, for many years was publisher of the Balfour Messenger. She also leaves two daughters and two sisters.

G. A. R. Veteran Dies
JAMESTOWN, N. D.—Josiah Pearson, 90, pioneer of Stutsman county, and veteran of the Civil War, is dead at Jamestown. He leaves a widow, one daughter and two sons.

Bickford to California
MINOT, N. D.—G. L. Bickford, former state treasurer of North Dakota and for some time past office deputy for Sheriff A. P. Scofield, will remove to Sacramento, Calif., about the first of the year and there join his family. He expects to engage in business at that point.

New Bank at Wolford.
WOLFORD, N. D.—A new bank, capitalized at \$20,000, the controlling stock held by Leeds citizens, and the rest by farmers of this neighborhood, will be organized here soon. It will be the second bank in the city.


