Shipped Cargo of Booze To South Dakota, Report

DON'T GET A BOND

Caught With Load of "Whiskey" For Peddling

FARGO, N. D.—Robert B. Leady, recently appointed acting group chief of the federal prohibition officers in the North Dakota district with headquarters in Fargo, was arrested Friday afternoon by the United States marshal's office on a charge of violating the federal prohibition laws by causing a shipment of intoxicating liquor to be transported from Fargo to Sioux Falls, S. D.

According to information received at the office of the United States district attorney in Fargo, Theodore Musjerd, one of the men who resigned a few days ago from the staff of prohibition officers, was arrested Thursday at Sioux Falls, having in his possession 125 quarts of whiskey which he had brought to that place from Fargo.

Musjerd implicated Leady, who was taken into custody as soon as a telegram from the authorities in South Dakota reached Fargo. Leady's bail was fixed at \$5,000, which he was unable to furnish last evening. He was remanded to the Cass county jail.

WHEAT YIELD IS SHRINKING

Government Shows Less Wheat Grown Than Expected

The wheat yield of the United States has shrunk rapidly in the last few months—and yet prices are falling and there are charges from NO-NEWS papers that there is "no gambling." A dispatch from Washington says: "The department of agriculture forecasts spring wheat yield of 218,007,000 for 1920. The winter wheat yield was forecast for 532,641,000, making a total of wheat yield of 750,648,000. The October forecast for spring wheat was 19,367,000 bushels less than the September forecast."
