

## REV. WALKER'S INFLUENCE BOOMERANGS AROUND EDMORE

### VOTES STRONG FOR LEAGUERS

Effect of Work Produced  
Strong Count For  
Frazier

### REPORTS TELL TALE

Nearly All Precincts  
Resented Walker  
By Ballots

Rev. Walker's influence in the Edmore district prior to election day acted as a boomerang for the I. V. A.'s. The effect produced by the "little preacher" was evidenced as the toll of votes poured into headquarters in Devils Lake after the count. The people of that region had registered a solemn resentment of the manner in which "Dr." Walker had addressed a public meeting at Edmore a week before election. His influence was "remarkable" as shown by the count. (Taken from precincts adjacent to Edmore.)

Newland township, bordering the village of Edmore on the east returned a vote for Governor Frazier of 103 while it gave O'Connor 10.

Triumph township, beginning three miles south of Edmore voted 55 for Frazier and 13 for O'Connor.

Fancher township in which the village of Edmore is situated but not including Edmore, registered its kick against the attacks of "the little preacher" on North Dakota and its people by returning a vote of 60 to 31.

Other townships scored similar protests at campaigning methods such as adopted by the accredited representative of the I. V. A.—"Rev." Walker. Exact figures, temporarily unavailable, but complete figures in detail and comparison will appear in the next issue of The World.

Altho Devils Lake poured a heavy vote into the I. V. A. total, many are known to have changed their decisions to vote for that ticket and "put one in straight for the Nonpartisan leaguers that don't send out that kind of men", referring to Walker.

## FREEDOM FOR ARAB WOMEN

Many Go Forth to Shop in the Business District Like the European Women.

While the Arabs of Algeria, in turbans and gracefully draped burnouses come out from their silently swinging doors, and with their staffs stroll into the European quarter of the city to buy food at some French shop, the Arab women who leave the Kasbah, the native quarter, are now enjoying a newer freedom.

The war has done it. The women are now allowed to go to other places than the baths and the cemeteries, the two traditional rendezvous where their husbands heretofore permitted them to gather. Many sally forth to shop in the downtown district like the European women. Some go to take tea at a fashionable French pastry shop, where they take off their veils, safe from the sight of Mohammedan men, and eat sweet cakes the Christians make. Then they put on their veils again, and, "shrouded in white mystery," go home to their hidden doors. Velled to the eyelashes in "haicks" as white as snow, they undulate slowly in the billowy, baggy trousers of 1,000 folds, and pass into the heavy wooden doors, brass studded, that swing noiselessly shut.—Century Magazine.
