**HARRY CLARK LOSES A HAND IN ACCIDENT**

Wood Saw Severs Member And Also Injures Al. Lunak

Harry Clark, secretary of the Teamster's union here, but recently employed at the Farmers Mill & Elevator company, lost his left hand in a painful accident at that company's plant last week. Operating a wood saw in the fuel department of the plant, Mr. Clark's gauntleted glove became entangled in a saw traveling at a high rate of speed and drew his hand into the whirling teeth. The hand coming in contact with the saw was severed almost completely at the wrist. The injured man was removed hurriedly to Dr. McIntosh's office and from there to Mercy hospital where he is now confined. Hospital attendants said this morning there is little likelihood of any complications setting in.

A few minutes before Clark's accident, Al Lunak, truck driver, for the same company, was hit with a flying block of wood from the same saw which necessitated the taking of several stitches in the side of his face. It was to finish the work left by Lunak when the latter's accident occurred that caused Clark to become involved in his accident.

Mr. Clark will look to the state Board of compensation for adjustment of his loss and it is believed Mr. Lunak will do so tho his accident was of minor nature compared to Clark's. Mrs. Clark is also a patient at Mercy hospital, having been recently operated upon for appendicitis.
