NEW LAWS WILL GO IN FORCE 30 DAYS FROM NOW

The initiated law approved by the people in last week's election, will take effect 30 days from the day of the election or on Dec. 2, provided the state canvassing board has convened prior to that time and certified the enactment of the laws.

Tomorrow county canvassing boards meet throughout the state for the purpose of canvassing the vote in each county, and the county boards are required by law to certify their returns to the state board immediately or not later than 30 days after the election.

U. S. Cash At Half Price Is Not Good Seller

FARGO, N. D.—Fred Gries, a farmer, could not get any takers yesterday afternoon when he offered Uncle Sam's money at a big discount in the lower Front Street direct.

Flashing a roll of bills, Gries according to the police, offered speculators who crowded about him, a \$5 bill for \$2.50 and a \$1 bill for 50 cents. There was not one game person in the crowd.

Reports that a man was offering money at a 50 percent discount reached officials of the North Dakota State Bankers association.

Police were notified and arrested Gries. The money that the prisoner had was examined by the police and found not to be of the counterfeit make as officials of the bankers association had expected.

The prisoner told the police he was joking with the fellows, who didn't know a good thing when they saw it. He was discharged.

SUPREME COURT GIVES DECISION ON LIQUOR LAW

Release Of Millions Of Gallons In Sight

STORAGE LAWFUL?

Hotel Stocks May Be Involved In New Decision

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Storage of lawfully acquired liquors in commercial warehouses and transportation of such stocks to the home of the owner is not prohibited by the Volstead act under a decision handed down by the supreme court.

In passing on the appeal of William G. Street of New York, from decisions of lower courts refusing to enjoin internal revenue officials from seizing liquors he had placed in a room rented from a safe deposit company, the supreme court reversed the lower courts and held injunctions should be granted.

The ruling effect had not been fully appraised tonight by internal revenue and prohibition enforcement officials. Belief was expressed, however, that the result might be the release of some ten millions of quarts of intoxicating beverages stored in warehouses since January 16.

Hotel Stocks Stored  
Records on file show that in addition to immense quantities of liquors purchased and stored by consumers, there were in storage large stocks held by hotels and restaurants as reserve. Whether these stocks come within the ruling has not been determined. It was anticipated less cases would be filed on this and similar questions arising from the undetermined scope of the interpretation of the Volstead act.

Justice Clarke, who rendered the opinion, held that the transportation of liquor from warehouses to the owners' home would be legal if the liquor had been lawfully acquired and for a lawful purpose. He said:

Justice Clarke's Decision  
"That transportation of the liquors is not such as is prohibited by the section is too apparent to justify detailed consideration of the many provisions of the act inconsistent with a construction which would render such removal unlawful, and that act is understood by officers charged with its execution as permitting such transportation as shown by the provision of the regulations of the bureau of internal revenue authorizing permits for transportation of liquor from one permanent residence of an owner to another in the case of his removal, although no such transfer is in terms provided for by the act.

The opinion pointed out, however, that internal revenue authorities undoubtedly had the administrative power to regulate transfer of such liquors so as to prevent their illegal use.

"An intention to confiscate private property" the opinion concluded, "even in intoxicating liquors, will not be raised by inference and construction from provisions of law which have ample field for their operation in effecting a purpose clearly indicated and declared."

STEEL TRUST HAS ENORMOUS PROFIT TOTAL

Net Earnings In Three Months Reach To \$4,051,540

Judge Garys United States Steel Corporation continues to be the prize profit-making industrial institution in the world. Its report for the third quarter of this year shows net earnings of \$48,051,540, after providing for Federal taxes and interest on bonds of subsidiary companies. This is an increase of nearly \$5,000,000 over the net of \$43,155,705 reported for the second quarter, and an increase of nearly \$8,000,000 for the earnings for the third quarter of last year.

Thus far this year the net earnings of the steel corporation have amounted to \$133,296,264, and the amount available for dividends is \$82,995,957, or the equivalent after preferred dividends to nearly \$11 a share on the common stock.

The corporation reported forward bookings of 10,374,804 tons as of September 30, an amount sufficient to carry the company along at something near capacity for seven to eight months.
