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23D BANK QUILTS ON MONDAY; ONE IS A NATIONAL

Three Banks Added To List Of Those Closed

BANKERS MEETING

Conditions Causing A Feeling Of Much Apprehension

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 8.—Three North Dakota banks closed their doors Monday and among these there was one national bank. The latter, the First National Bank of Medina, is the first national bank to fail in the present crisis and also the first member of the federal reserve to be forced to the wall in this state this fall. It had \$25,000 capital.

The other two banks which closed are the Citizens State bank of Edgeley and the State Bank of Northville, both in LaMoine county. Heavy withdrawals by depositors were reported to have caused the closing.

Closed by Directors

The First National Bank of Medina, in Stutsman county, was closed by its directors, according to a statement over the long distance telephone by A. Prezzler, a director. The bank is a member of the federal reserve system. This makes 22 state banks and one national bank closed in North Dakota recently.

"We have been aided by the federal reserve system and it has helped keep us going," said Prezzler. "Our reserve was wiped out, however, and we asked a national bank examiner to come out and take charge of the bank, not making any further request of the federal reserve system, which had not denied any previous request."

Depreciation of livestock and grain values and farmers not selling their grain were given by Prezzler as the reasons the institution was forced to close. He said the bank would probably reorganize under new management.

Many Bankers Gather

The hotels of Bismarck are filled tonight with bankers from all parts of the state who have come to attend the meeting called by O. E. Lofthus, state bank examiner, for tomorrow. The meeting will be held in the senate chamber in the capitol building. Speculation is rife as to what the outcome of this meeting will be. Mr. Lofthus has called the state bank-

ers together to discuss the crisis confronting the state and to suggest ways and means to prevent further closing of banks.

Another Royal Suggestion 3-Egg Angel and Sunshine Cakes From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

AN Angel cake that fairly melts in your mouth. Instead of eight eggs it can be made with three and the yolks of the eggs can be used for a Royal Sunshine cake.

Angel Cake
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup scalded milk
2 teaspoon almond or vanilla extract
whites of 3 eggs
Mix and stir first five ingredients four times. Add milk very slowly, while still hot, beating continuously; add vanilla; mix well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until light. Turn into greased angel cake tin and bake in very slow oven about 45 minutes. Remove from oven; invert pan and allow to stand until cold. Cover top and sides with either white or chocolate icing.

Sunshine Cake
3 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon flavoring extract
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup flour
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, and yolks of eggs which have been beaten until thick; add flavoring; sift together flour and baking powder and add alternately, a little at a time, with the milk to first mixture. Bake in greased loaf pan in moderate oven 35 to 45 minutes. Cover with white icing.
