To Meet At Bismarck In February To Discuss Legislation

Sixteen and eighteen dollar "suckers" are out of order. Join the I. V. A., it costs twenty-five for a sustaining membership. The twenty-five will let you into the elite society of the regular Ivas—and it will help pay up a deficit in accounts said to amount to about \$8,000.00. No, the I. V. A. isn't dead, but its hard up apparently according to the Fargo Forum which makes an appeal for finances as well as announcing a gathering of its clan at Bismarck February 11th to consider legislation.

The announcement says: A meeting of the Independent Voters association to be held at Bismarck on Feb. 11 was called in a statement issued by E. W. Everson, president, and Theo. G. Nelson, secretary. The purpose of the meeting is to consider "needed and pending legislation" and to discuss plans and policies "germane to the activities of the association." The meeting will be on a delegate basis, a unit being entitled to one delegate for the first 10 members, and one additional delegate for each additional 25 members.

In a statement issued in connection with the call for the convention, prepared at a meeting in Fargo this week of the executive committee, 16 members being present, it is announced that an active campaign to enroll members for the coming year will begin immediately after Jan. 1. The campaign will be maintained throughout the state with the expectation of enrolling all of the old members and a large number of new members. It is stated in the announcement that none of the membership fees paid in for the coming period will be devoted to the deficit of about \$8,000 carried over from the recent election. Sustaining memberships in the association are placed at \$25, and the regular memberships at \$10. The statement calls attention to the fact that women are now eligible to vote and women are urged to enroll as members.
