COLLINS RAZOR CONCERN FACES TROUBLE REPORT

Receivership Rumors Reach Grand Forks

GRAND FORKS, N. D.—The Collins Safety Razor Co., of Chicago, makers of and holders of patents on a razor which embodies a rotary cutting principle, is reported by stock holders in Grand Forks to have gone into the hands of a receiver. Large amounts of stock in the company were sold in Grand Forks as well as throughout the entire state. The company completed its manufacturing plant in the Lake district of Chicago during the past summer.

Last reports of the proceedings do not indicate the exact financial situation of the concern. The liabilities are reported at \$225,000 which is thought to be sufficiently covered by assets.

POPULATION 117,857,509 CENSUS REPORTS

North Dakota Has Poll Of 645,680 Souls Shown

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—The population of the United States with outlying possessions is 117,857,509, according to revised census figures, the outlying possessions totalling 12,148,738. These possessions are: Alaska, 64,899; American Samoa, 8,056; Guam, 13,275; Hawaii, 255,912; Panama Canal Zone, 22,858; Porto Rico, 1,299,807; Military and Naval service abroad, 117,238; Philippine Islands, 10,350,640; Virgin Islands of the United States, 26,051. MINNEAPOLIS CHAMBER WILL GO ON TRIAL

Charged With Trying To Crush Out The Equity

MANY ALLEGATIONS

Boycott Is Part Of A Formal Complaint Filed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(Special) — The Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce must stand trial before the federal trade commission on charges of seeking to crush out the Equite Cooperative exchange and other cooperatives dealing in grain. The commission today formally announce the issuance of a complaint of "unfair competition" against the chamber, its officers, directors and members. After answers have been filed by the defendants the case will be heard. The owners, publishers and editors of "the Cooperative Manager and Farmer" a grain trade paper published in Minneapolis, are likewise cited in the case.

The Equity Cooperative exchange at St. Paul with 7,000 grain growers as members, has been excluded from membership in the Minneapolis exchange because of its cooperative principle. The complaint charges a conspiracy to destroy the business of the Equity. It is alleged the following means were adopted to wreck the Equity:

(a) False and misleading statements concerning the Equity circulated in the "Cooperative Manager and Farmer" and the "Northwestern Grain Grower" and otherwise.

(b) Institution and carrying on of vexatious litigation, causing it great expense, injuring its credit and weakening it in competition.

(c) Refusal of the Chamber of Commerce to permit the Equity or its allies to get the telegraphic market quotations from sources it controls.

(d) Boycott of members of the Equity exchange and their grain, by enforcement of stringent rules by the chamber; one of such rules specified is the "uniform commission rule," discriminating as to commission rates to be charged on grain coming from certain terminal markets as against certain other terminal markets, also eliminating competition between members of the Chamber exchange, and discriminating against non-members in favor of members, and depressing the price of grain purchased by members.

Situation Like North Dakota's This complaint, in substance, sums up the farmers of North Dakota based on their decision some years prior to the launching of the Nonpartisan League, that they could not fight Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce except by a program of state-owned grain marketing facilities.
