BRIEF ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM ALL PARTS

**Velva Enters League**  
Velva, N. D.—The Velva high school has organized a debating team and will enter the State High School Debating League.

**Home Is Buried**  
Belmont, N. D.—Fire destroyed the residence here of John Lorentzen, with all contents. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

**Towner Court Adjourns**  
Towner, N. D.—With the jury cases completed the district court, in session here during the last three weeks, has adjourned until Jan. 4th when the court cases will be taken up.

**Wilton Woman Injured**  
Wilton, N. D.—Mrs. W. C. Jackman, nurse of Wilton vicinity, while taking a patient to Tucson, Ariz., was injured and bruised in a railroad wreck near Eufala, Okla., according to word received here. She is recovering.

**Shot In Shoulder**  
Velva, N. D.—John Martin was shot in the shoulder, though not seriously wounded, when he tried to re-enter a local resort after being ordered out. Reports have it that the men in the party had been drinking. Martin declined to prosecute.

**New Rockford National Guard**  
New Rockford, N. D.—Interest has been aroused here over the possibility of New Rockford's organizing a national guard unit, as the result of a recent visit of Major Harold Sorenson, of the adjutant general's office. It is expected the local Legion post will help sound out local sentiment on the project.

**Seek To Raise Rates**  
Lidgerwood, N. D.—The Lidgerwood Mill company has applied to the state railroad commission for authority to raise rates on lighting, power and heat. It says it is furnishing current at less than cost at present rates.

**To Bury Leper**  
Bismarck, N. D.—The state board of health has a problem on its hands. The father of Mrs. Houst, "the leper of Crystal Springs," died, and, according to word received by President Langer of the board, no one will undertake to bury him because he has been living in the same house as his daughter, who is said to be in horrible condition from leprosy. The local authorities reported to the county auditor of Kidder county and he appealed to the state board. Arrangements will be made to bury the man.

## The Great Farm Bureau What It Is And Just Why

First of all, the Farm bureau is a county organization of farmers. Thru this organization the farmers themselves become directors of all agricultural extension work in the county. The farm bureau is recognized by the United States Department of Agriculture and the State agricultural colleges as the official body of organized farmers in the county. All agricultural extension work in the county is carried on thru the farm bureau. A program of work is developed in each community in the county, and from this a county program of work is developed under direction of the Executive committee of the farm bureau.

**Membership Open**  
Any person who is interested in the agricultural welfare of the county may become a member. But only actual bonafide farm women or farm women can hold office in the Farm bureau. And at least 80 per cent of members of the Farm bureau must be actual farmers.

The administrative head of the county Farm bureau is the executive committee, which is composed of the officers of the bureau and three to five other members, elected at the annual meeting of the bureau.

Each community or township of the county has its own chairman and community committee. Each member of a community committee represents some certain project or line of activity which is being promoted in that community. All members representing the same project in the various communities together constitute a County Project committee.

**Charge—Butchering Cattle**  
Fort Yates, N. D.—John Martel and John Hendrickson pleaded guilty last week before Judge J. M. Hanley at Mandan, to the charge of butchering cattle. Martel was remanded to the State Industrial school at Mandan until he attains 21, and Hendrickson was released on parole.

**Newspaper Changes Hands**  
Mayville, N. D.—The Mayville Equity-Tribune, has been sold by the former publisher, L. C. Leum, to Gilbert Tein of Fargo, who formerly conducted a job printing plant there. The style of the paper has been changed to the old name of the Mayville Tribune. The editorial policy of the paper is described as "strictly neutral." Mr. Tein formerly published The Panorama of Aneta.

**New Chief At Minot**  
Minot, N. D.—George McDonald, of Minneapolis, formerly special agent at Winnipeg with the Grand Trunk Pacific, has been appointed chief of police of Minot. McDonald's appointment was recommended by the joint committee of the Minot Rotary club and Minot Association of Commerce and Police Commissioner D. W. Bowker. The committee recommended a salary of \$2,500 a year, which the board granted. He will assume duties in Minot January first.

**Barney Bank Robbed**  
Barney, N. D.—The Bank of Barney was robbed of \$2,500 in cash and between \$15,000 and \$20,000 in securities by yeggs who belew the doors of both vaults and the safe. No one appears to have heard the sound of the explosions and the robbery was not known until the cashier entered the bank.

The job is believed to have been done by experienced men, who escaped in an automobile. Because of drifting snow the tracks were obliterated.

**Big Land Deal**  
Grand Forks, N. D.—For a consideration of \$89,800, O'Connor Brothers Land Company disposed of 660 acres of choice Grand Forks county farm land to an Iowa buyer yesterday, it was announced last night, marking one of the most important transfers of property recorded here in several months. The farm purchased by the Iowa man is claimed to be one of the most modern in the county. It is equipped with excellent farm buildings, modern in every respect. Improvements alone are said to be valued at more than \$25,000.




## DAIRY FACTS

### WASTE STEAM MADE USEFUL

Utilization Is Economical on Account of High Prices of Coal and Electric Power.

The practical value of using exhaust steam in various creamery operations is being demonstrated by the dairy division, United States department of agriculture. Last year 45 creameries installed exhaust-steam water heaters and hot-water boiler-feed pumps, assistance being given and, in some cases, plans furnished by government specialists. Equipment for use

ing exhaust steam to pasteurize cream was installed by six creameries and a number of others introduced similar economies.

The result of such efforts, it is pointed out, makes possible more economical operation. The high prices of coal and electric power have given added importance to the utilization of steam formerly wasted.

### FLIES TORMENT DAIRY COWS

Mixture Recommended by Minnesota Expert to Keep Pests Away During Summer Season.

By preventing flies from tormenting the cows much greater flow of milk is secured during the summer months and the remainder of the lactation period. The following home-made mixture has given good results at the college dairy farm. It is better than several other mixtures tried and quite as

efficient as the prepared sprays costing a dollar per gallon. It is made as follows:

- 1 1/2 quarts of any standard coal tar dip.
- 1 1/2 quarts fish oil.
- 1 pint of oil of tar.
- 1 quart of coal oil.
- 1/2 pint of oil of Eucalyptus.
- Mix in ten gallons of lukewarm soft water in which a bar of laundry soap has been dissolved.
- Spray twice a day, in the morning after milking and in the afternoon when cows are brought in for silage or green feed. When a half barrel cart with spray nozzle attachment is used two men can spray a herd of forty cows in ten minutes. This mixture is not perfect and does not keep all the flies away and, furthermore, it leaves the coat rather harsh and causes dust to adhere; however, it is very beneficial and practical and results in more milk and greater comfort.—H. H. Kildee, University Farm, St. Paul.

### CALF-FEEDING RULES

1. Do not overfeed.
2. Give feed in a clean, wholesome condition.
3. Have the utensils scrupulously clean.
4. Feed regularly and in small quantities.
5. Always feed at a temperature of 95 to 100 degrees Fahrenheit. Use a thermometer—do not use your finger.
6. Give the calf water to drink.
7. Be regular in everything.
8. Give the calves exercise in the open air during good weather, but do not expose them during cold, rainy weather.
9. Provide clean, well-lighted pens with plenty of bedding.
10. Gruel feeding may be continued after the fourth month if desirable or it may be discontinued at three months of age, and the calf be put on a hay and grain ration.

### KILL STABLE FLIES QUICKLY

Ten Per Cent Solution of Formalin in Milk Sprinkled in Gutters Is Recommended.

A quick and sure method of killing stable flies is to make a 10% solution of formalin in milk and sprinkle it on the cement floors and gutters. The flies are attracted to it and are killed in 30 minutes. Then the floors are

washed and the stable is clean for the day. This operation is repeated each morning as long as necessary. At the beginning of the campaign it will take several mornings to clear out the flies, but after that it will be necessary to do it only as often as they become bothersome. Their breeding place in the manure pile outside the stable should be done away with and the manure drawn out daily to the fields or placed in a fly-tight pit.

### PREPARATIONS REPEL FLIES

Fish Oil Is Principal Ingredient in Several Mixtures Recommended for Stock.

While there are various preparations on the market designed to keep flies from cows or other live stock, the farmer can make a good fly repellent by using any of the following mixtures: Fish oil, 3 parts; kerosene, 1 part. Fish oil, 100 parts; oil of tar, 50 parts; crude carbolic acid, 1 part. Fish oil, 1 1/2 pints; kerosene, 1 1/2 pints; resin, 1 1/2 pounds; laundry soap, 2 cakes. Mix thoroughly and add enough water to make 3 gallons. Fish oil, linseed oil, or kerosene, 1 pint; coal tar dip, 1 pint; laundry soap, 1 1/4 bar; hot water, 15 pints. Mix thoroughly so as to form an emulsion. The fish oil is the principal ingredient that repels the flies.

Either a brush or a hand-sprayer can be used to apply any of these mixtures. The sprayer will be more convenient. Applications will have to be made at frequent intervals to be effective.

### GIVE BULL GOOD ATTENTION

Best Results Obtained by Firm Handling, but Never by Abuse—Must Have Exercise.

The bull must not be underfed when young nor kept overfat when matured. Better results are obtained by gentle but firm handling, but never by abuse. Never allow him to get the upper hand at any time; he must not realize his enormous strength. Give him plenty of exercise it is a mistake to keep him confined. Do not trust a bull at any time. It is the "gentle" bull that does the damage.
