

RAIL WAGE CUT TO BE DECIDED BY REFERENDUM

Chicago, July 6. — The membership of sixteen railroad labor organizations, including the Big Four brotherhoods, will decide thru a referendum vote by September 1, whether to accept or reject the 12 per cent wage reduction that went into effect on railroads thruout the country July 1, it was decided tonight by the chief executives and fifteen hundred general chairmen of the organizations.

The general chairmen decided that they could not assume responsibility for the wage reduction that was ordered by the United States railroad labor board.

GUNBOATS TO TAMPICO, MEX

Washington, D. C., July 6. — Two American gunboats have been sent to Tampico, Mexico, to guard against any possible trouble in the oil fields there, Secretary of Navy Denby announced today.

The recent announcement by the Standard Oil company that they were withdrawing their tankers from carrying oil out of Tampico roused fear that some trouble might arise from men being thrown out of work, Denby said. The ships sent to Tampico were the Sacramento and Cleveland, the first from Cristobal and the canal zone and the latter from Galveston.

The Standard Oil company is withdrawing its tankers, according to an announcement, because of the recent imposition by President Obregon of 25 per cent export tax on Mexican oil.
