DEMPSEY HOLDS TITLE IN U. S.

American Champ Trims Frenchman In Four Rounds

The World was the first to Devils Lake to announce the final knock out of the French pugilist for championship honors, receiving the message in his office and making the announcement public by bulletin and press within eight minutes from the time the fight ended. A special service via Fargo enabled the management of the popular weekly to demonstrate its ability to meet all emergency news demands ahead of all competitors.

Dempsey, American heavyweight champion boxer, walloped Carpenter, French title holder in their famous battle at Jersey City Saturday, bounding the contender for the World's title the K. O. in the fourth round of their bout. There was nothing to it for the American. Bunching his fists, and every swing was a poke in the body, counted. The skill of a boxer was never evidenced in the champion—he could take all the punch the Frenchman had and it didn't bother him. Thirteen minutes of actual fighting occurred before a crowd of 91,800 persons, according to reports.


