Arrow Deadly as Bullet.

A mounted Indian or white man with bow and arrows sometimes could kill more buffaloes than a man could kill with a rifle, says the American Forestry Magazine. At close range the arrow was as deadly as the bullet, it made less noise, and arrows could be discharged three or four times as rapidly as bullets from muzzle-loading guns.

The strike of wilton and brussels carpet weavers, affecting five cities, has been settled, it was announced at Philadelphia. A satisfactory adjustment was reached following a conference of the workers and employers. The strike began January 8, upon the announcement of a proposed 25 per cent reduction in wages. The terms accepted by the workers include 20 per cent reduction in the wages of weavers and 10 per cent in those of fixers.

Shipyards workers of Kobe, Japan, who have been on strike for several days, decided to resume work on the strength of a preliminary compromise settlement which gives the workers a voice in the mechanical direction of the plants.

One thousand musicians employed to New York vaudeville and motion picture houses went on strike. The musicians declared the strike was in anticipation of a "lockout" slated for the following week, when the managers announced they would terminate existing wage agreements.
