D. D. Norton, one of the pioneer farmers of near Grand Harbor passed away at a local hospital last Thursday night after a short illness. He is survived by his wife, who is ill at a local hospital, and a nephew, W. L. Norton of Rockford, Ill., who arrived here Friday night to make arrangements for the funeral. The deceased was 76 years old and was born at Starrow Bush, N. Y., where he spent his boyhood days. Later he moved to Dulard, Ill., and in 1882 he came to Ramsey county with other pioneers and accumulated some land south of Grand Harbor, where he and his wife resided up to the time of his death. He was an industrious, well meaning fellow, always progressive, and was very popular among his neighbors and friends by whom he will be greatly missed. The funeral was held from the Church of the Advent Sunday afternoon at three o'clock, the Rev. Garfield-Walker officiating.

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
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
