

### Woman Turns Blue From Poison Effect

Mrs. Shipley and her elder son, Frank, eleven months old, were blue about the lips and the finger tips. Robert, the eleven-day-old infant, was blue from head to foot and apparently in pain. The victims were able to walk to the City hospital. The case is puzzling physicians there. The disinfectant was simply sprinkled about the house and its principal constituent is bitter almond juice.
