Jury Term District Court November 13

Judge Hanley Heard Three Cases Tuesday, and Ordered Jury Term to be Held on November 13th

A special term of district court for Sioux county was held at Fort Yates Tuesday with Judge Hanley of Mandan presiding. Only three matters were brought to the attention of the court. The first matter taken up were the cases against Z. Hummell and Dayton Heileman, charged with assault growing out of a knifing affray at Selfridge early this June.

Some time ago a motion to dismiss these cases was made, but when the matter came up before the court the complaining witnesses failed to withdraw the complaint, and States' Attorney Johnson refused to file a dismissal. These cases will therefore go over to a term of court to be held November 13.

The divorce cases of Henry Zahn vs. Mary Zahn, and Clara Manywoods vs. George Manywoods were granted. The Zahn divorce was granted on the grounds of desertion, and the Manywoods case was brought on the grounds of cruelty.

In order to clear the docket of the pending criminal cases Judge Hanley ordered a special term of court to be held on November 13th. This will be a jury term and a venire of 30 jurors has been drawn, which is published elsewhere.

Dempsey-Forte Nuptials

At the Catholic church Monday morning at 8 o'clock, Rev. Father Bernard in the presence of a few friends and relatives of the contracting parties pronounced the vows uniting in marriage Margaret Dempsey to Joseph Forte. The bride was attended by Mrs. Leo Archambault, and Chas. Carignan acted as best man. The relatives present were John Dempsey of Isabel, brother of the bride, and Mrs. Leo Bruiguire of McLaughlin, mother of the groom.

After the ceremony a sumptuous wedding breakfast was served in the dining room of the Agency Boarding school by the sisters of the Fort Yates Sisterhood, at which covers were laid for ten. Afterward the party proceeded to the J. M. Carignan home where a reception for the newlyweds was held.

Mr. and Mrs. Forte are popular young people. The bride has been employed at the Carignan home for the past year, while the groom has been freighting between McLaughlin and Fort Yates, and lately has had charge of the Carignan livery and feed barn. They will make their home at the Standing Rock Hotel, of which they have taken charge under a lease held by Mr. Carignan.

Coture Bound Over

George Coture was arraigned before Judge H. L. Henke late Wednesday afternoon to answer to a charge of horse stealing. He was held to the district court and released when he furnished \$500 bonds. Coture is alleged to have been one of a gang engaged at stealing horses from North Dakota farmers selling them in South Dakota and then reversing the process. —Mandan Pioneer, Oct. 12.

Next Indian Land Sale List Published

Complete List Indian Land Advertised for Sale December 27th, Published in this Issue of Pioneer

In this issue of the Pioneer is published the complete list of Standing Rock reservation non-competent and inherited Indian land in North and South Dakota advertised for sale December 27.

The list is not nearly as large as for the previous sales, which will make it much easier for prospective buyers to make their selection. The land advertised for sale has all been recently appraised, and for this reason the successful bidder is assured that there will be no delay in having the sale approved.

All the land previously advertised and not included in this list has been withdrawn, and will not be advertised for sale again until re-appraised. As land values are on the increase now is the time to buy before another advance. Now is a good time to inspect the land while the weather is fine and the roads in good shape for travel.

Bids can be sent in by mail or will be received by Superintendent C. C. Covey, who has charge of the sale, up to 2 o'clock p. m., of the day of sale at his office in the Agency building at Fort Yates. Before submitting bid the bidder should read over the rules and regulations governing the sale and carefully observe same.

Hughes in N. D. Movies

Fargo, N. D., Oct. 23.—Judge Hughes speaking to a big crowd at Grand Forks and meeting cowboys at Medora, are among the scenes of a two reel moving picture that has just been sent out from Fargo on the rounds of the best movie houses of North Dakota. The Grand Forks scene shows him shaking hands with scores of people from the rear platform of his train, and speaking in the park.

In Medora cowboys are shown riding their skittish horses up to the automobile, and leaning far over to shake hands with the next president of the United States, amid much prancing and flourishing of lariats. When the train left, the cowboys put on a stunt of their own, following it at breakneck speed down the track, in a shower of pebbles, cinders and dust. The picture taken from the rear platform as the train sped away, shows the swaying of the cars, and Medora receding into the distance, in thrilling fashion.

It is an all round picture, fine from the photographic point of view, and one that will interest every person who enjoys travel views, who likes the movies, or thrills with actors in the lively scenes of the best films. The scenes are of historical interest.

Fire Destroys Property

A. S. Kempton, who resides west of Morrilton lost his farm buildings by fire Monday last week. The origin of the fire has not been learned but it is thought that it might have started from a cigar or cigarette as there were a number of men there as they intended to start threshing on that day. At the time of the fire the a strong wind was blowing and it was thought for a while that the house would burn, but with considerable hard work it was saved. The barn and sheds were all destroyed together with considerable hay and feed, which is a big loss to Mr. Kempton. —Morrilton World.

Missouri Ferry 'Ida' Now At Fort Yates

Ferry Boat Again in Operation on Missouri River Between Fort Yates and Winona.—Litigation On

The ferry boat Ida is again in operation on the Missouri river and making crossings between Fort Yates and Winona daily. Oscar Baumann sold the Ida last summer to parties at Cannonball, and recently seized the boat under attachment proceedings, and it was returned to Fort Yates by Deputy Sheriff Urell about ten days ago.

Through his attorney Baumann the first of the week secured an order out of district court permitting him to operate the boat pending adjudication of the action he brought to recover the Ida from House & Brewster. It will only be a short time now before the river freezes over, but in the meantime there are a number of cattle to cross and the laying up of the boat pending the outcome of the litigation would be a hardship and inconvenience to the public as there is no other way of getting across the river.

The releasing of the boat from the sheriff is in the interest of the public welfare and will in no way affect the merits of the action between Baumann and House & Brewster, nor will it have any bearing on the outcome of the case.

Rural Credits Law a Fake

The rural credits law was passed to make platform timber at the St. Louis Democratic convention in 1916. It was rushed through in a hurry to help the Wilson administration cover up some of its failures to make good on pledges of 1912. John Burke said in a speech opening his campaign for the senate, "It would seem as though that was sufficient to go before the people."

The rural credits act is pictured to the public as a farmer's act. It is really a banker's act. It is unthinkably cumbersome. It establishes a governing body of five members (at \$12,000 each) a number of districts and separate sub-governing bodies for each (all at high salaries); an army of counsel, land appraisers, experts, secretaries, and others—for what purpose? To help farmers borrow money at the same old rates of interest on the same old kinds of security—but only after unwinding reels of red tape.

It gives not a single tenant farmer one cent of relief. Only the owners of land or those who can prove they are immediately going to own land can get its "benefits." To get these "benefits" they have to turn around and pay back five per cent of the money for bank stock.

But anyone else can buy this stock also, and with it participate in the management of the rural credit banks. Thus any banker can buy this stock and continue to rule the destinies of the farmers, as bankers do now. The difference is that direct dealings between farmer and banker are superseded by a roundabout way that will cost a lot of more money, but bring no atom of improvement. The law lets the rural credit banks have government money at three per cent, but farmers can borrow it from rural credit banks at six per cent only.

Watch for Non-Partisan Judiciary Ballot and Vote for Hanley for District Judge on November 7th

Special attention is called to the non-partisan judiciary ballot to be voted at the general election. This is a small separate ballot on which will be found the names of the candidates for judges of the supreme and district court.

The Pioneer wishes to impress on its readers that it is for the best interest of the district to re-elect Judge Hanley. At the primary election Judge Hanley received nearly twice as many votes as his opponent, but as the law now reads where there are only two candidates in the field at the primary election both go on the ballot at the general election. In most of the other judicial districts in the state where there were two candidates the one receiving the lowest vote at the primaries has withdrawn his name. But B. W. Shaw, who is opposed to Judge Hanley has not done so, and for this reason Judge Hanley's friends should get busy and see that he receives the same vote on November 7th, that was accorded him at the primaries.

Brown Gives Bond; Dando Is Arrested

Giles T. Brown Released on \$3,000 Bond Until Trial November 13.—T. G. Dando is Arrested

Giles T. Brown arrested last week on the charge of having attempted to kill John Stevens on October 8, Saturday furnished a bond in the amount of \$3,000 and signed by E. J. Winters and A. H. Barkley, both farmers living in Sioux county north of Watauga. Brown will have his trial at the term of district court which convenes November 13. He will plead self-defense and has retained Attorney Pat Morrison of Mobridge to defend him. Stevens has practically recovered from his wounds.

Thos. G. Dando, one of the directors of Hanna school district in Sioux county, was arrested last week and arraigned before Justice Ostrum Saturday on the charge of defrauding the district. He waived examination and was held to the term of court to be held November 13th. Dando was released on his own recognizance.
