Pembina will come to the front with a Broad Gauge Programme for Celebrating Independence Day.

Grand Parade, Martial Music, Speeches, Fire Works, Amusements, Etc., the Order of the Day.

The Four Corners with other Towns and Neighborhoods will join in a Grand Demonstration.

There was a meeting of the citizens of Pembina, on Tuesday evening, at Kitten Hall, to take into consideration the matter of celebrating the Fourth of July. Judge Armstrong was called to the chair and R. H. Young was appointed secretary. A resolution in favor of celebrating the Fourth, met with the hearty concurrence of all present. On motion the chair appointed the following committee to solicit contributions to defray the expenses of the proposed celebration: J. G. Webb, C. J. Brown and R. H. Young. A committee was also appointed consisting of Capt. Webster, J. V. McIntyre and R. J. Strong, to make the necessary arrangements for speeches and music. C. J. Brown was constituted a "committee of the whole," to clear away and prepare the race course. The meeting adjourned until

WEDNESDAY EVENING when a report from the finance committee, showed that nearly \$300.00 had been raised to cover the expenses of the celebration. This was considered a sure start towards a rousing good celebration. J. G. Webb, C. J. Brown and Judge Armstrong, were then appointed a committee of management, with power to aid to their number and with authority to rush things to their final consummation. The present indications are that Pembina will this year furnish one of the most attractive celebrations, and enjoyable holidays ever had in the Northwest. The committee of management were unable to complete their arrangements in time to announce a perfected programme in this issue of the PIONEER-EXPRESS. Next week full particulars will be given.

We have said that the programme is not yet complete. We are enabled to announce, however, that a brass band is to be engaged, good speakers secured, base ball, horse races etc., and that the day will be wound up with a grand display of JAPANESE DAY FIREWORKS.

Inasmuch as darkness comes too late for many people living at a distance to return home after witnessing a night display, the committee have decided to provide day fireworks, such as are often exhibited at watering places. They comprise a selection of curiosities such as Animals, Fish, Birds, Caricatures, Dragons, Beautiful Colored Smoke effects, &c., &c., thrown from a gun to a high altitude, releasing these figures, which float through the air to the wonderment of the beholder.

A Fire.
