A DANGEROUS SYMPTOM.
The public has been called upon to witness another act in the tragical Uniontown drama. Young Nutt, after weeks of deliberate preparation, took his opportunity, shot Dukes and thus avenged the death of his father. Few will mourn the fate of Dukes. He deserved death, if ever a wretch did. Nevertheless, we regret to see some papers making this affair the pretext for encouraging the practice of mob law. The Minneapolis Journal goes so far as to glorify young Nutt and declare his act consistent with eternal justice. Says the Journal:

All public opinion requires is that the avenger shall be sure that his victim is guilty. We do not place these words in type as the peculiar or exclusive opinion of The Journal, but simply as the crystallized sentiment of the preponderating mass of people in this country.

But the trouble is that the "public opinion" that governs an excited mob will never stop to weigh evidence. The public may, indeed, be disgusted, now and then, at the failure of a jury to meet out justice to some death deserving criminal. But if the practice of lynching is to be encouraged and commended by the public, where will it end? Without diminishing crime it will tend more and more to weaken the force of law and order. Rather let a remedy be applied where the evil exists. Let there be a movement to modify or abolish the jury system. Let all our courts of law be made independent of party politics. Especially let us not give aid and encouragement to a practice in its very nature designed to weaken the influence of our courts of justice and demoralize the cause of law and order.

The object of the company in building such a road would be to make money. The object of the people in encouraging such a road would be to get a direct route to Chicago and secure

better prices for their produce. The policy of Mr. Hill and the Manitoba road would be to oppose the building of such a line and keep it out of this valley as long as possible. The fact that Mr. Hill now takes an attitude of open hostility to the new road down the Red river is one of several indications that the enterprise is making good headway.

HEADING THIS WAY.
The Brainerd, Grand Forks and Pembina Railroad Company Organized and the Survey Begun.

The Brainerd, Grand Forks and Pembina railroad project, which for over two years has been talked of, seems to be getting in practical and definite shape. We clip the following from the Fisher Bulletin in regard to the matter. "At a railroad meeting held in Brainerd, of the directors of the Brainerd, Grand Forks and Pembina road. Hugh Thompson of this place was made vice President, and the route of the survey established. The surveyors are nearly to Red Lake Falls at this time. After reaching the Falls they return on the line some ten miles and run a line from that point through Gently, Carman, cross the Red Lake at Fisher, terminating at Grand Forks. From Red Lake Falls they go to Warren, thence down the Red river to Pembina. The survey will reach us within two or three weeks."
