ABOUT TOWN.

SEVERAL interesting communications reached us too late to find room in this week's issue.

The Black Caps of this town again defeated the Emerson boys at a match game of base ball on Friday last, at the Emerson grounds, the score being 34 to 22.

MR. GEO. GROGAN shows us a fine sample of White Australian oats of which he has a few acres in crop which he thinks will go 48 lbs. to the bushel and 60 bushels to the acre.

By order of the town marshal some luxurious patches of weeds in less traveled portions of the town have been consigned to destruction and our correspondent of last week, "Observer" can roam serenely where he will.

The special school meeting called for Monday afternoon was not numerously attended, one of the members of the school board and a very large number of citizens being absent. Another meeting is to be held of which notice is given elsewhere.

W. R. CANHAM, of Tynes, writes us a letter in which he pronounces a eulo gium on the PIONEER-EXPRESS, incloses a six months subscription and declares his intention to be a life long subscriber. We suspect that Mr. Canham is a man of excellent judgement.

HARVESTING is not as fully under way at this date as was anticipated a week ago. The grain has been ripening very slowly, which is all the better for the yield both as to quantity and quality. The prospects of a magnificent yield are improving hourly.

REV. C. H. BRENTON of West Emerson had a narrow escape from drowning on Tuesday. He was rowing across to Emerson when his boat upset, and being able to swim very little he would have gone down had it not been that some parties from Emerson got to the rescue.

The editor of the West Emerson Times rolls up his eyes, washes his hands with invisible soap and pronounces this solemn question:

WHAT IS IT TO BE?—Will the Times amalgamate with the International, the International with the Manitoban, the Manitoban with the Times, or all continue as you were before boys?

A GENTLEMAN in this town writes a letter to the PIONEER-EXPRESS calling attention to the practice of hunting and duck shooting on Sunday. The letter is personal in that, although it does not name anybody, it characterizes the objects of the attack so as to indicate their identity. Without publishing the article we will voice his sentiments by saying that the practice is very venous and contrary to the laws of our territory, and should be discontinued by all good citizens.

Sunday's Rain Storm.

The most violent rain storm of the season, if not the severest for several years, visited this vicinity on Saturday night and Sunday last. The rain fell times, and very heavy accompanied frequently with high and fitful gusts of wind. Trees were swayed violently, the strength of buildings pretty well tested and leaky spots in roofs thoroughly searched out. No serious damage was done, that we have heard of. The storm seems to have been more violent to the north, doing much damage to the crops. Reports from Winnipeg are to that effect. We cannot hear of any serious harm done to any crop near here.

THE St. Vincent has discovered a mysterious record in the registry office of that town. It says: "We have seen a lot that is on file in the office of register of deeds. It is called the Highland Addition to St. Vincent, and plots all the ground into town lots from the east side of the original town plot to the section lines, beyond the new transfer building. The streets of the new plot on an extension of Atlantic, Pacific, and Washington avenue which now extend to and beyond the transfer yard. Whether this is simply a scheme to bring the custom house within the village of St. Vincent, or a new scheme by the railway company to give a boom to our village we are unable to tell at present."

THE Fargo Southern railroad, which it is expected will be continued down the river to this point next year, is reported as making rapid progress. Rumors were circulated to the effect that the projectors were about to sell out to Jim Hill, upon which the Fargo Republican has the following to say: Several of the directors of the Fargo Southern railroad called on the Republican and stated positively that the rumors of negotiations for the sale of that road to any parties, which have been in this community for some time and which were published in this paper under the head of "Railroad Rumors," are entirely groundless; that there has been no intention of selling; that there have been no negotiations with Mr. Hill or any other parties in that direction, but that the company are pushing the road as rapidly as possible, and really intend to have the road running to Ortonville by the first of November. These statements are authoritatively made by the officers of the road the numerous rumors that have been about for sometime in relation to the matter."

REV. R. J. CREWELL received a letter a few days ago from the Rev. Alonzo Barnard, of Benonia, Mich., which will be interesting to the new as well as the old settlers of Pembina county. It reads as follows: "In the summer of 1853, Rev. D. B. Spencer and myself established a mission station at what was then called St. Joseph and Pembina Mountain, some thirty-five miles west of Pembina town. By the assistance of the Hon. Alex. Ramsey, the first governor of Minnesota, I received \$500 from the civilization fund at Washington for the purpose of establishing a boarding school for Indian and half breed children. The following autumn my wife was stricken down in the midst of her busy missionary work. In the spring of 1854 I took my poor motherless children to friends in Ohio. On my return in October I met Brother Spencer with his three motherless children, whose mother had been murdered by Sioux Indians. I spent the following winter there but the hostility of the Indians rendered it unsafe, so I fled to the Red River settlement, now Manitoba. For several years I labored there as a lay missionary under the direction of the Episcopal Bishop of Rupert's Land. I knew Mr. Chas. Cavileer well; also the late Rev. J. Black and family, and have often preached in his church at Killdonan. The bodies of Mrs. Barnard and Mrs. Spencer lie side by side somewhere under the now busy town of Wahalla." Mr. Barnard concludes by offering his services as a missionary in his old age in the region to which he gave his best days. Old settlers who knew him then say "give him a chance," and the Presbyterian church authorities will most likely do so.

THE McClellan Mission Band will be postponed until Friday evening, Aug. 31st, on account of Talmage's Lecture. Mrs. Travis, the president of this Band, has gathered into it a large number of the young people of the town, and all are combining their skill and good taste, as well as their religious devotion, to render the occasion the beginning of good things in this direction. The church will be decorated, and every effort made to please and gratify good taste as well as to arouse a noble spirit of missions.

QUARTERLY Meeting Services. Quarterly meeting service will be held next Sabbath at the M. E. church, the Rev. L. D. Wardwell officiating. The administration of the Sacrament will take place immediately after the close of the morning service. We cordially invite all christian people in good standing in other churches to come and participate with us, and we earnestly urge upon all the communicants in our own church to be present at this solemn service.


