AROUND TOWN.

The county commissioners meet Monday next.
The delinquent tax list will be published next week.
Mr. Henry Baldwin returned last week from Ontario, and was warmly greeted by his many friends.
Some person or persons were mean enough to steal a good plow from Mr. Samuel Ardes, a few miles south of town, one day last week.
Dr. C. S. Smith, dentist will be in his office on Stuttsman street Monday Aug. 31, but will remain only a short time at this visit owing to harvest.
D. E. Andrews has removed his barber shop from Rolette street to the building next to Piche's, where he has a nicely fitted and furnished tonorial parlor.
Mr. Chas. O'Hara has shown us a sample of oats from his farm. They are of a new variety, the heads being very long. There were counted on one head 240 kernels.
Mr. P. Jennings is moving his house, occupied by Mr. Kellar, from Second street in the southern part of the town across to Caviler street near Capt. Jack's house. Mr. James Auld has the contract for moving it.
We are pleased to learn that Mr. W. J. S. Traill is going to reside in this town with his family, his farming interests and the extensive improvements in his mills rendering his residence here a necessity.

A GAME of cricket between a picked and a scrub eleven of this town, was played in this town last Friday afternoon. The game excited not a little interest, being closely contested, the score resulting in a tie.

THE RED STOCKINGS of Emerson, came over on Wednesday for a game of base ball with our Black cap boys. But no game took place, the Black Caps, or a number of them, not having heard that a match had been arranged.
Mr. W. L. Joy, having obtained the position of head miller of the Dominion City flour mill, has removed with his wife to that town. Before leaving Mr. and Mrs. Joy were waited on by a company of friends and were made a present of some valuable silverware in testimony of their labors in the M. E. church and Sunday school. Their departure is much regretted by their many friends.

FRED WINTERS with his span of goats drove along Caviler street Wednesday evening. They make a fine team, though inclined to stop occasionally when they take the notion.
Mr. G. B. CROOKSTON from Ypsilanti, Mich., has been in town and the vicinity for a few days. He is a business man of experience and capital and thinks of locating somewhere in this part of the country. The editor knew him well when they both lived in Grand Forks four years ago, and can testify to two things; that Pembina county has good opportunities for such a man as Mr. Crookston and that he is a good man for Pembina county.

HARVESTING is now in full blast, the work of cutting in some portions of the county being about finished. The weather so far, on the whole, has been favorable. Farmers are disposed to begin at the grain while yet a little green, which is wise in view of the great amount to be done in so short a time. Besides owing to the cool weather so favorable to the growth of grain to the very last, the berry is unusually plump and very liable to shell when the grain is ripe. The late grain is coming on to maturity in fine shape. The hum of the threshers has already begun in some parts of the county.

We are now approaching the climax of the dull season. Like the calm before a storm is the season of quietude before the rush of business that will set in when the rains get on its rapid movement outward. The farmer does not go to town unless a break in machinery or some other unlooked-for occurrence calls him away. Human muscle and horseflesh are at a premium. Reaping, shocking, stacking, threshing, marketing and fall plowing will all be going on at once for the next few weeks. All the country is a stage and farmers are the principal actors. Happy is that business man who has no farm to look after now, but can go rambling over the prairie and around duck ponds with his double-barrelled dog and gun.

Dr. Talmage's Lecture.
Quite a number from this town went to hear Talmage lecture on "Big Blunders" at Emerson last Friday evening. All report the lecture an enjoyable treat. The reverend gentleman seemed to be in good health and spirits—in good trim for work. The audience was not very large. The price of admission—one dollar and fifty cents—was a little steep for the times. Still those who paid it got the worth of their money. The lecture contained a mixture of wit, humor, poetry, eloquence and every day philosophy. Dr. Talmage is a large souled, merry-hearted man with a versatile mind, and a familiarity with the various types of human nature, which enables him to present those phases of thought and life that more readily stir the people's mind. The good Doctor was subjected to a lengthy and exhaustive eulogy by the chairman, Rev. Brenton, who in introducing the lecturer gave an analytical review of his life and character.

Thieving Smugglers.
Alex. Pilon was arrested and brought before U. S. Commissioner Kneeshaw on Monday, charged with smuggling cattle across the lines from the Menomonee settlement. It seems the fellow had been engaged for some time in stealing cattle from the Menomonees and driving them across to this side, selling some of them to the butcher at Neche. He was committed for trial and is now in charge of U. S. deputy Marshal Brown.

Fred Marcellais and Little Fisher, a half breed and an Indian, were also brought before Commissioner Kneeshaw on Wednesday having been arrested for smuggling horses from Manitoba. It seems these were two escaped convicts from the Manitoba penitentiary. It was found on the trial that Little Fisher had sold his horse on this side but Marcellais had been more cautious and left his on the other side, Little Fisher was committed.

Marcellais was serving a term of five years for forgery. He is an expert penman and a noted sharp.

Agricultural Association.

Prominent citizens from various parts of the county met at Bathgate on Wednesday, August 22d, and formed themselves into an organization, which they determined should be called the "Pembina County Agricultural Association." The object of this society is the encouragement of Agriculture and Horticulture in all their branches, of stock raising, fine arts, etc. It was decided to incorporate the society under the laws of the territory, and a committee of incorporation was duly appointed. It was further decided to hold the first exhibition on or about October 15th, 1883. The directors shall consist of one member from each municipal township, which were duly elected. I. F. Houston was elected president and C. L. Parker secretary treasurer. The farmers are warm supporters of the movement. As soon as stock is issued a chance will be given those who desire shares to procure them. The best of good feeling prevailed throughout the meeting, though every one present felt at perfect liberty to express his views. The general verdict is that a great amount of good work was done. The meeting delayed for more than an hour for the arrival of the south train, hoping that it might bring in a number of farmers and others interested, but it's being late prevented any from coming.
