Manitoba Wheat Grading.

As will be seen by the accompanying list of grades, there is lots of margin to come and go on for the Manitoba wheat buyer, and one would think it would take a pretty good man to do justice to all these grades.

No. 1 hard; No. 2 hard; No. 3 hard. No. 1 northern; No. 2 northern; No. 1 rejected; No. 2 rejected; rejected hard; rejected spring; "rejected hard," smutty No. 1 or No. 2 hard wheat; "rejected spring," is smutty No. 2 northern or No. 3 hard.

Another Nomination.

A petition to which fifty-eight names were attached, was filed in the auditor's office on Wednesday, nominating Isaac E. Mussell, by occupation "miller," of the town of Drayton, as a candidate for commissioner in the Fifth District. The petition set forth the claim that the nominee is a representative of "democratic principles."

Mr. Mussell is well known in his district as a conservative business man. He has never taken a very active part in politics, but is well informed and if elected would make an excellent member of the board. This means somewhat of a race in the Fifth District and it stands between Mr. O'Brien of Drayton and Mr. Mussell of Drayton. No opposition to Mr. Myrick in the First District has developed. The time has closed for filing petitions or nominations with the auditor, though the law still allows any elector to place the name of anyone he chooses on his ballot.

Manitoba Honey.

Mr. JAMES DUNCAN, of Dominion City, was in town on Saturday last, with about 600 pounds of honey from his own apiary. The honey was of the finest quality
