St. Thomas and Hamilton played a game of base ball on the fair grounds Thursday forenoon. The game was not called until 11 o'clock. W. S. Gilpin was chosen to umpire the game. Hamilton won the toss and took the field. St. Thomas boys are great kickers, they kicked because the umpire rendered decisions and because Hamilton white-washed them the first four innings, and in order to settle things Gilpin retired and Dick Weeks called "balls" for the rest of the game. It was a hotly contested game. Bowers pitched for St. Thomas, Bowers is the same fellow that came into Hamilton several weeks ago and tried to show the boys how to pitch.

Governor Devine, Thursday. Although there was an immense crowd of people who would like to have heard him, they got along very nicely without him. Early Thursday morning the judges commenced to award the premiums. Prof. Ward was on hand with a new balloon and made three ascensions. Two of the royal pipers from Winnipeg helped to liven things up with some excellent Scotch music. The Pembina band discoursed sweet music, in fact the Pembina band was an attraction. The races Thursday and Friday were very good. Two steam merry-go-rounds helped to amuse the young folks and some of the older ones too. The parade of prize stock nearly reached the entire distance around the race track. A striking figure and one that attracted considerable attraction was Master Ralph Chisholm and the two royal pipers seated in a dog cart and drawn by a Shetland

pony. Ample provisions were made for entertaining the immense crowd that visited the fair.
