MEMORIAL DAY.
It has passed into a proverb that "God
loves the old soldiers" and it is rare that
the 30th of May is other than a pleasant
day. Still the weather prophets eyed
askance the lowering clouds that veiled
the sun early in the morning of Tuesday,
and it looked very dubious if umbrellas
and rain coats would not be added to
the uniforms and costumes of those who
took part in the procession. But prob-
ably Joshua or some other old soldier
was on duty in the weather department,
and while the clouds hung low and dark,
they were held back, with the result that
the day was as pleasant to marching
men and cheering throngs as would have
been the best summer day.

DECORATIONS.
Thinking and its colors in all sorts and
degrees in evidence, and while beauti-
ful, the position at half-mast denoted the
solemn and mournful significance of the
day. The weather signal staff of W. C.
Shaw, at one end of a cross yard held
the flag at half-mast while at the other
end the flag signals fluttered that said
"Remember the Maine." All the stores
and business residences were
more or less decorated and some very
elaborate.

Many homes were decorated with
pennants and flags, and the
Pembina band, under the
direction of Mr. Anderson,
played the "Marseilles" and
other patriotic music during
the procession. The
proceeding was a grand
success, and the day was
one to be remembered.

nately in red and white dresses, around
each of whom a stripe of the flag was
encircled; on the lower step on either
side stood a guard of soldier and sailor
boys in uniform, the whole making a
picture of color and beauty.

Then came the old soldiers under the
command of Commander Moses Heller of
Worden Post G. A. R. The following

THE CHILDREN.
Following the old soldiers came the
children of the public schools, many of
them in the fancy costumes in which they
appeared at the entertainment on Friday
evening. Then came citizens on foot
and in carriages in a long line, the whole
making a procession of remarkable
length considering the size of the town.

AT THE CEMETERY.
The beautiful and impressive cere-
monies of the G. A. R. were rendered,
the graves duly decorated with flowers.
The graves of the following soldiers
were duly decorated with flowers and
the little flag planted in the iron mem-
orial symbols that have just been placed on
the graves: Comrades of Worden Post,
W. R. Goodfellow, August Gerardin and
J. W. Winchester; also Veterans Henry
Eck, Charles J. Brown and Oscar Klose.
The sons of veterans who lie sleeping
here were also similarly honored and a
large proportion of the private graves
were also strewn with fragrant remem-
brances by loving relations. "Taps"
were sounded and the procession re-
turned.

AT THE GROVE.
Under the green roof of the leaves in
the grove just in front of Mayor La-
Moure's, seats and a stand had been
erected and a large audience gathered
there shortly after one o'clock to listen
to the remainder of the program which
was carried out very nearly as published
in the last issue of this paper. Com-
mander Heller in a short address of well
chosen words and the reading of the
general orders by Adjutant Sonderman
represented the G. A. R. A trained
chorus of vocalists rendered several
patriotic pieces and were warmly ap-
plauded.

THE ORATION.
by Rev. Dr. Forbes of Duluth was elo-
quent, witty and patriotic. It was full of
gems of thought and rich in historical
allusion and apt illustration. His theme
was largely a tribute to the Anglo Saxon
race, its past and its future. Dr. Forbes
believes in expansion and that America
is by its form of government and pro-
gressive ideas the best fitted for expan-
sion of any country. He avowed him-
self as Canadian born, and paid a high
tribute to the Queen and the English flag,
which he wanted to see flying along with
the American flag all over the world.

THE WALLACE BOYS.
Lewis D. and Charles Wallace, sons of
Hon. J. D. Wallace of Drayton, who were
attending the university at Minneapolis
when the Spanish war began and who
enlisted in the 13th Minnesota Regiment,
were present on the invitation of the
committee and as guests of the city.
They only got home to Drayton last
week from Manila, and both look as
though they had passed through rough
experiences. Lewis, the eldest, who was
wounded, ruptured and typhoid fever, had
a combination that would have killed a
man of less robust constitution, is re-
covering rapidly and says he has gained
thirty pounds since he left Manila about
two months ago. Charles had good
health up to a short time before his dis-
charge, but still looks pale and thin from
dysentery from which he has not yet re-
covered. A pleasing and interesting in-
cident was the presentation of a flag to
the boys by Rev. Dr. Forbes at the
ceremonies. The flag was the property
of the Wallace family and was the
same that was used by the boys in the
war. It was a beautiful flag and was
presented to the boys with much
ceremony. The boys were very
pleased and the presentation was
a very interesting incident of the
day.




