District Convention.

The Methodist ministers and laymen of the Grand Forks District have just closed a delightful conference at Park River. The questions of "The Pastor's Leadership," "The Present Spiritual Condition of the church," "Spirituality Defined," A paper by Rev. W. P. McVey of Grand Forks, the publication of which was asked for. "Methodism and Higher Education" were helpfully discussed. A stirring sermon on "The Life Abundant" was preached by Rev. Stephen Whitford of Lakota.

The usual work of examinations, renewing local preachers' and exhorters' licenses was attended to, and after passing the following resolutions, the preachers separated with fond recollections of the time and place.

RESOLUTIONS.

It is with feelings of devout thanksgiving to the God of all grace that we assemble in our annual session of this district conference. We desire to extend to the pastor and people of Park River our hearty thanks for the kindnesses we have received from their hands, and the pleasure of meeting in this thriving city.

With heartfelt sympathy we hear of the afflictions which have come to the homes of our Brothers James, Shawkey and Lee; and we rejoice that the lives of their loved ones have been graciously preserved.

While we are intensely interested in the upbuilding of the kingdom of Christ among men, we recognize our responsibility as citizens of this republic, and we urge our people to maintain that standard of righteousness which exalteth a nation. To this end be it resolved,

That we co-operate as far as possible with the efforts of other Christian churches and organizations in securing the unseating of Brigham H. Roberts, the Mormon who has been elected to congress from Utah.

As those who come closely in contact with the people we are able to know of the enforcement of the prohibitory liquor law. There is reason to rejoice in the better enforcement of this law, we urge upon our people to heartily support the State Enforcement League in their efforts to further enforce this law.

We would express our feelings of indignation at the high-ban led manner in which the attorney general has caused to be set aside the desires of the representatives of the people so unequivocally expressed in the army canteen question.

We highly commend the action of Hon. John D. Long, secretary of navy, in the abolition of the canteen on United States war vessels.

Our beloved Presiding Elder, H. C. Klingel, has almost completed the full term of his office. The past six years have been years requiring patient, careful and skillful oversight. At their close we mark the wisdom of his administration, and extend to him our hearty congratulations, on this, the fiftieth anniversary of his birth; and we pray that he may be spared for many years of toil in the Master's service.

We are glad to have present with us the Rev. E. P. Robertson Ph. D., the newly-elected president of our Red River Valley University. Our love for, and devotion to this, our Conference Educational Institution is undiminished. After having heard Dr. Robertson's inspiring address on "Methodism and Higher Education," and learning his plan for the future of the school, we pledge our continued devotion; and comply with his request to take, at an early date, the "Educational Collector, and forward it to the treasurer of the college. At all times we shall welcome Dr. Robertson to our charges.

We desire that these resolutions shall

be published in the papers of Pembina, Park River, Grand Forks, and the Midland advocate.
