### PARTIZANSHIP NOT ANARCHISM.

One half of the people of this United States are not banded together as partisans to destroy this government; and yet in times of political strife many newspapers and political spell-binders, in effect, declare that to be a fact. Democratic and populist papers and speakers define the republican party as made up of trusts, monopolies, bankers and bondholders who are seeking to corner gold and otherwise to control the market and particularly the labor market for their own enrichment and aggrandizement.

Republican journals cast back the slur and intimate that democrats and populists are but a grade or so above anarchists who seek to destroy all private ownership of property, tear down the flag, etc.

All newspapers and speakers do not speak as broadly as this, but in very few cases do the partizan press give the opposing party credit for anything but partizan and ulterior motives. This is all wrong, and in these days when the doctrines of anarchism are so universally condemned, may not we of the public press "the moulders of public opinion" look at our own eyes and see if there be not beams that obstruct our vision. The great republican party is not a party banded together to distress the laboring man; the great democratic party is not seeking to tear down the flag; the populist party does not want to have a new divide of all real estate and personal property. It any of these or similar things were true, then we are indeed anarchists, and anarchist remedies would be right, for bullets and not ballots would be the only cure.

We differ in methods, in details; we can do so honestly and sincerely, but all of us are citizens of this great republic; and when the tocsin of war sounds or in the presence of a great nation calamity, we stand shoulder to shoulder in the defence of our loved land and in sympathy with its institutions.

A high tariff republican, a free trade democrat, or a silver dollar populist is not necessarily a bad citizen because of his peculiar belief, indeed, that he has pronounced beliefs in methods of government proves his interest in the government. We should rather fear and condemn the ignorance and indifference that leaves uncultivated ground in which the poisonous weeds of discontent, malice and anarchism grow and flourish. We should never forget, even in the hottest political issue that there is always a broad distinction between a partizan and an anarchist, that one is for government by certain methods, while the other is against all government by any method.

### TRUE LIBERTY.

There is no such thing as absolute personal liberty where two or more persons are living in juxtaposition. To enjoy absolute freedom the individual must be isolated and even then is forced to obey the laws of nature. Because each person has individual rights, and because the exercise of all, these rights would necessarily interfere with some of a neighbor rights there must be restriction of individual liberty when two or more people live in the same locality. Notwithstanding government precludes personal liberty, yet this government of ours was founded on and for the principles of true liberty.

"That all men are created equal, that they are endowed by the Creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights governments are instituted among men," are the words of the Declaration of Independence.

Government and law are practically synonymous terms. Law is a set of rules by which the conduct of each man is regulated in his relations with his fellow man. The law restricts and governs. It says "do this," and "do not do that," but law is instituted to secure true right and liberty. Hence law is true liberty while individual freedom is only another word for license and anarchy.

"Free speech" and "free press" are words dear to the American heart but we must not forget that true liberty is founded on restraint. Whenever speech becomes so free, whenever the press takes such liberty as tends to destroy this government, they have gone beyond the limit of liberty as defined by the Declaration of Independence and are infringing on that true liberty, which is "for the people, of the people and by the people of this nation."

The Grand Forks Herald very sensibly proposes the name of Col. Enos Stutsman as one of the two representatives of Dakota pioneers in the Hall of Fame at the St. Louis exhibition. From our own knowledge of the early history of Dakota no other name stands more pre-eminent in the period when the foundations were being laid. He died in this city previous to the time of the writer's coming to Pembina, but many intimate friends of his among the old settlers here have always spoken of the highest possible terms of his character and ability. He was a member of the first territorial council in 1862; president of the councils 1863, 1864 and 1865, member council 1866, speaker of house 1867, member house 1868 and member council 1872, which shows in part what an active factor he was in that formative period of our first ten years of territorial organization.

Miss Inez Godward, who has spent the past year and half at Mayaguez, Porto Rico, as a missionary, arrived in Hillsboro, Friday morning for a short visit with her brother Prof. Godward. Miss Godward was in Porto Rico under direction of the Presbyterian mission board, her expenses having been provided by Y. P. S. C. E. societies of the Red River valley. She will leave here shortly to take a course in college before proceeding further with her work.—Trail County Times.

The Palladium charges Attorney General Comstock with being intoxicated and gambling at the Mandan Fair. We are sorry if it is true, and we hope he may be able to clear himself both for his own sake and that of the republican party. But the Palladium in its editorial course gives the reader the impression that the charges are made as slurs on the republican party in general and the prohibition law in particular, and to satisfy a grievance against Mr. Comstock.
