## Dog Fight at Swell Reception.

It was 5 o'clock, and the light shed by lamps and candles was artistic to the point of dimness, when there sauntered in, with the nonchalance peculiar to the aristocratic canine, a fox terrier of the wicked variety. He made friends right and left, the guests supposing him to be the property of their hostess, and she in turn questioning in her mind who had the bad taste to bring a dog to an afternoon tea. It happened, too, that being a lover of cats, she hated dogs.

"Ah," the lady remarked with evident effort, to one of her guests, "it is your little dog?" and every one could see she was nervous. But no one claimed the dog, and at that moment a second fox terrier rushed in, carrying the light of battle in his eye and barking madly. He was in pursuit of dog No. 1. It did not take long to find him, and then there began such a chase, and such an ear-splitting din, and such a frantic race over trailing gowns and patent leath-

ers as to demoralize utterly the hostess and the guests of that afternoon tea. A genuine dog fight was imminent. To add to the excitement, a pet maltese cat sprang from a Turkish corner and joined in the stampede.

"Who brought those awful dogs into my house?" shrieked the hostess, dodging this way and that to rescue her cat, but no one answered the question, and the exciting chase went on, over chairs and sofas, until the butler managed to head off the trio and eject them into the street. By that time more punch had been spilled over immaculate shirt fronts and more scalding tea upset into the laps of innocent matrons, and more foreign invective uttered by the numerous embassy attaches present than the hostess cares to recall.

It was learned later that the dogs belonged to the two families on either side of the official's home, and that there existed between them a feud of long standing. The terriers had escaped bondage at the hour stated, and selected the scene of the afternoon tea to settle old scores. ## The Pleasure of Skunk Hunting.

Veteran Explains Methods Which Enable Him to Gather In the Little Midnight Prowler—Some Risk Attendant Upon Pursuit of This Sport.

A man who is in the habit of hunting skunks says:

"You want to know how I kill skunks without getting scented. I put on an old suit, so if I do get a little dose it won't hurt anything. I have an old duck coat with big pockets on the inside which I have used for a trapping coat for a number of years.

"The skunk seldom goes out in the day time, but as soon as it gets dark he begins to prow. They live mostly on crickets and grasshoppers, and in the fall they are very fat. Often I have found it an inch thick on the back in skinning them. If pains are taken in skinning not to touch it with the hands, this oil, when tried out like lard, is the best thing for a cold or croup I know of—used externally, of course.

"As the skunk lives in the wood-chuck holes in the meadows and pastures, I can always tell where to find them, for they make little holes in the dirt with the nose which look very much as though some one had poked the ground with a cane. Wherever the skunk makes one of these

holes he gets a cricket, which, in the fall, as the ground gets cold, burrows under the grass roots. The fox digs for crickets, too, but as he digs with his paws the hole is somewhat different in shape.

"A moonlight night with the wind in the south I have found the best to hunt them. I generally carry a lantern, so that I can skin them at once and save lugging them around. I cut a stick from a sapling about the size of a broom handle and about six feet long. Armed with this I take the warpath through the fields, keeping a sharp lookout for any black spots that seem to move.

"The skunk is generally busy looking for grub, and as soon as I spy him I run right at him. You have to be quick, not because the skunk will run, for they can't run very fast, but the sudden approach scares them so they will face you with the hair bristling on end, just as a hen will when you try to catch one of her young. This is the time to strike, and one good blow on the head generally does for them, but woe to the hunter who fozzles this first blow, as the golfer says."

## Many Jews Going to Palestine.

Zionist Movement Making Great Progress—Idea Is Ultimately to Purchase the Territory from the Sultan—He Is Very Friendly in His Attitude.

Jewish immigration to Palestine continues apace under the auspices of the Alliance Israelite, which alone spends 1,000,000 francs a year on the Hebrew colonies and schools in Turkey and other philanthropic societies. The latest phase of this migration, known as the Zionist movement, has for its object to revive the Jewish state by purchasing Palestine from Turkey. The movement, though conducted by some as Utopian, and ridiculed by others as sentimental in origin, possesses considerable interest for the unprejudiced observer of Eastern affairs. No one who has watched its growth can doubt its practical importance.

Although the Sultan is not prepared to grant all that Dr. Herzl demanded, there is sufficient ground to believe, with Dr. Herzl, that the negotiations will most probably, at no distant time, lead to a conclusion satisfactory to the sultan and the Zionists alike. This hope is strengthened by the Sultan's attitude toward the Jews, which in its benevolence contrasts curiously with the treatment

meted out to his Christian subjects. Two years ago he appointed members of the Hebrew community to important posts in the Turkish army, while he attached two more to his personal entourage. On another occasion his majesty evinced a lively interest on behalf of the same race whose good repute was sullied by one of the blood accusations periodically brought against the Jews by the Christians of the East, and caused the local authorities to take steps to prove its groundlessness, thereby earning the thanks of the Anglo-Jewish association.

Perhaps it is to this increasing favor of the Jews in the eyes of the Sultan, and the consequent fear of opposition to Russia's designs in Palestine, that we must attribute a step lately taken by the Russian government. The Minister of Finance is reported to have forbidden the sale of the Jewish Colonial Trust shares in the Czar's dominions, a step which has created great perturbation in the camp of Polish Zionists, the most deeply interested in the concern.—Edinburgh Review.

## VENTILATION IN THE HAT.

Peculiar Notions Indulged in in Regard to It.

Some customers have nonsensical notions about the proper way to ventilate a hat," said a fashionable hatter. "In fact, they are so whimsical about it that we make the hats without a ventilator and try to suit the wishes of the customer after he has handed his money to the salesman. Many customers will not have a hat ventilated at all. Well, they miss a great deal of comfort and take long chances for baldness in old age. The English style, and the only one that some buyers will adopt, is a ring of perforated holes in the crown of the hat. In my opinion it is just as well to have no ventilator at all as to put two holes, one on each side of the hat, just above the band. Then you get good circulation all the time. There are ways of punching the holes artfully so that they do not detract from the appearance of the hat. But you would be surprised at the


number of men who will not have them, some because it is not fashionable, and others because they think the hat will not wear so well."—New York Press.
