SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.
 The 15th Annual Convention of the County S. S. Association met at Pembina in the M. E. church on July 8th, under the most favorable auspices of weather, attendance and arrangements.
 Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Whitford. A committee was then appointed to fill vacancies on the program. Pres. Pratt gave a short address.
 Secretary made her report. She urged the value of statistical reports to the individual as well as for the county Association. Pembina county has 50 well organized S. Schools. The Secretary reported having written 187 letters, 25 postals, sent out 91 blanks for state, and 50 blanks for county reports, and 175 programs. Report adopted.
 Treasurer reported total receipts for year, \$102.24. Disbursements \$105.42. Balance due Treasurer, \$3.18.
 The following committees appointed. Resolutions—Rev. S. Whitford, James McEwen, F. Joy. Nominations—Messrs. Martin, Inglis and Short.
 In the absence of J. M. Wylie, subject "What do we expect to get from this convention?" was taken up by Rev. Van Tassel and others. Some points were: Come expecting much; a spiritual uplift; that will fit for better work; a knowledge of what others are doing.
 "Getting scholars to bring and use Bibles," by Rev. Orchard. The Bible is the great text-book. It should take the supremacy.
 Boys should be provided with reference Bibles of pocket size. Honor the Bible by use in school and use lesson helps at home. Rev. Van Tassel and others followed in same line of thought.
 "How shall we grade our S. S.?" by Rev. Cook; Sunday schools should be subject to the modern science of education. By Rev. Orchard; grading is an incentive to more thorough system of work; two systems of grading; on merit and on markings; for small school, markings preferable; scale attendance 50, lesson 30, offering 10, Bible 10, attending church 10, pass-mark 75. A book "The Up-to-Date S. S." should be in the hands of every worker.
 "Need of weekly Teacher's Meeting;" Rev. Hall. Very needful and helpful. Some benefits; more perfect union between pastor and teacher; spiritual growth; conformity of spirit and intellect.

 "Shall we teach Catechism?" Rev. J. Hall. The catechism and Bible verses taught to our fathers should be taught to our children. Rev. Coomb suggested the Catechism was the basis of better problems. Suggestions as to best methods followed.
 "The Teachers Greatest Needs," Mrs. G. S. Hillis. The paper was full of good points and enthusiastically received. Essentials in a teacher: regularity, punctuality, kindness, sympathy, co-workers with pupils, cheerfulness, brightness, look at, not over, the class. Have tact, and courage. The daily life of the teacher outweighs the lessons given.
 Adjourned to evening at 7:30.

 Song Service conducted by Rev. Van Tassel.

Dr. Falloon gave an address of welcome in behalf of the people of Pembina. Anthem by the choir. Response by Rev. Bell. Selection by Quartette.
 Rev. Orchard then gave the address of the evening "That Dreadful Boy." The speaker made earnest appeal for fathers to walk in the ways of righteousness; the boy is the counterpart of the father. Love the boys into the Kingdom. Mothers should make home the sweetest place in the world for their boys. No carpet too fine for your boy to walk and play on. Share the boy's mistakes as well as his pleasures.
 The convention was favored with a trio. Offering amounted to \$6.70.
 Adjourned to meet at sunrise prayer meeting.

THURSDAY MORNING.
 Devotional exercises by Rev. Coombs. Minutes read and approved.
 Report of State convention by those present at Fargo. Rev. Newlove from a pastor's standpoint. Mr. Melville from a Superintendent's, Mr. Pratt as a teacher, Mrs. McFadden as a Secretary. Rev. Orchard showed the value of the state Convention to the work at large. All counties but three are organized with 33 conventions and 10 institutes held during the year. The entire section of state west of the Missouri has been visited with conventions from which as yet we have no financial help. The state thru conventions and institutes has incited to the enrollment of 3,000 Home Dept. members, 4,000 Cradle Roll members, and 800 Normal students. The state is in 3rd class as to proportionate amount of increase in advance work of the states of the Union. Increase in day schools in the state for three years is 20 per cent, while in the Sunday schools it has been 25 per cent. The older counties have been the givers and missionaries in this aggressive work, which has come largely through the state and local associations.
 "Temperance Problems and how to solve them," by Rev. Jacobs. Statistics show that the Americans spend three times as much for drink than for education. The Sunday school and church are the right ones to contend. We must be right ourselves, and do nothing to lead others astray.
 "Reports of the county Schools." Thirty schools responded, and \$3 paid up their dues, amounting to \$64.90. Total received during convention \$70.90.
 "How has Pembina Co. Association helped the State and County." Discussion by Messrs Melville and Halcrow. We can all be a blessing to others by sharing what God has entrusted to our care.
 "Our Mission as Christian Workers," Rev. S. Whitford. Jesus has hired us and sent us into his vineyard. Our mission is one of love. Rev. Newlove appealed to all workers to be missionaries for Christ.
 "How to Prepare a Sunday School lesson," by Mrs. Wilson. Know God and his work, know yourself and your work, know the children and their work. The children's work is to be full

of possibilities. Prepare, labor, there may be a Moody or a Roosevelt in your class. Look at lessons from child's standpoint. Love attracts. Make preparation in prayer.
 Invitations for next session received from Cavalier by Mr. Hall and from Neche by Mrs. Henderson. Invitation to Cavalier accepted. Nominating committee reported the following officers: President, Mr. Pratt; Vice Pres. Mr. Martin; Treasurer, Mr. Halcrow; Secretary, Mrs. McFadden. Supt. Home Dept. Miss Garnett; Primary Supt, Miss Jessie Halcrow.
 Convention adjourned at 2 p. m.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.
 Resolved, that we accord our sincerest thanks to the people of Pembina and the officers of the Sunday schools for their untiring efforts in providing for this convention and their visitors.
 Resolved, that we recommend holding of district institutes whenever practicable and whenever they shall best serve the interests of the Sunday schools; and would designate the following places wherein such institutes shall be held, viz: Cavalier, Crystal, St. Thomas, Bathgate.
 Resolved, that we will uphold and promote all forms of legislation that have in them a recognition of the Christian Sabbath. That we will not tolerate any form of popular amusements which are bound to desecrate the Christian Sabbath and set a bad example before the people. We will pledge ourselves to keep the Sabbath day holy and thus strive to build up the kingdom of God.
 Resolved, that we deplore the widespread and debasing influences of the use of intoxicating liquors. We call upon our teachers and the people in general to unite in a persistent and uncompromising effort in the name of Christ and the church to develop an intelligent, progressive and Christian public sentiment for the overthrow of the liquor power in our land. That we express our highest appreciation of the persistent efforts of States Attorney Brynjolfson and Sheriff Atkinson in prosecuting the violators of our prohibition law and promise them our unqualified and untiring support in their endeavors to enforce that law.
 Resolved, that we heartily appreciate the intense and untiring efforts of our executive officers in the work of the Association.
 Resolved, that we express our appreciation of the presence with us of Bro. John Orchard. We especially recognize his intense earnestness and devotion to the work of helping forward the work of Sunday schools and pray God that he may be ever blessed in the discharge of his arduous duties.
