U. S. Department of Agriculture, appear-  
ed before the Board in the matter of the  
proposed topographic survey of lands  
in Pembina county as embodied in a  
resolution passed by this Board March,  
8th, 1906. He informed the Board that  
his department would be ready to be-  
gin field operations not later than July  
1st, 1906. On motion it was resolved  
that the county Auditor be and is hereby  
authorized to issue warrants to said  
John Stewart, Drainage Engineer, for  
sums of money as shall be called for  
to defray expenses of the work.

On motion it was resolved that the  
proposition submitted by Walker Bros.  
& Hardy to furnish assessment books  
and all necessary blanks, tax lists, tax  
receipts, tax sale record and tax sale  
certificates for Pembina county for the  
year 1907, for the sum of \$490 be and is  
hereby accepted.

warrant number 10713 to the Fargo  
Bridge & Iron Co., for \$2000 for part pay-  
ment for bridge work is hereby approv-  
ed.
